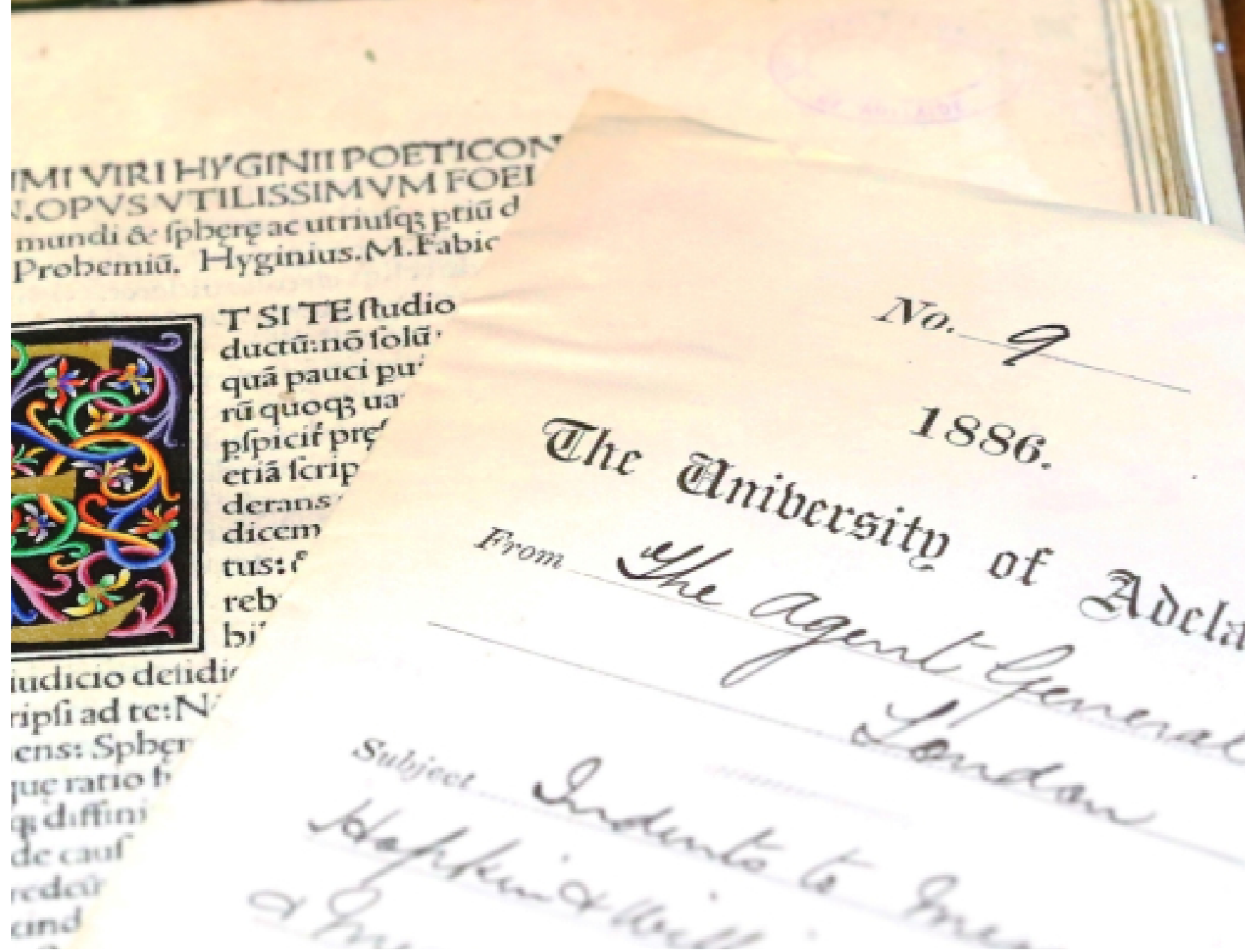


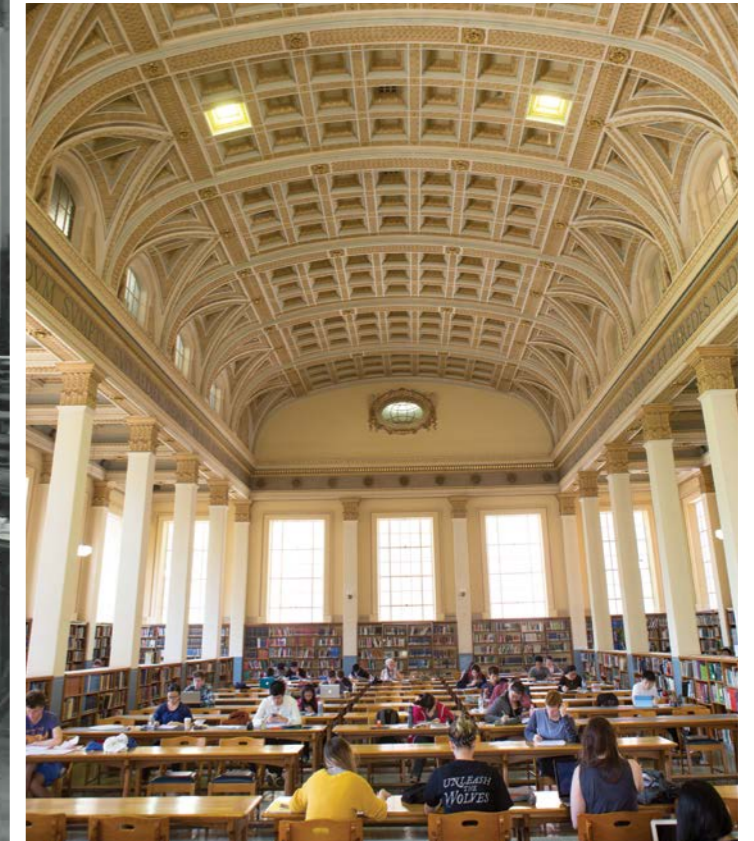
INTRODUCTION

The University of Adelaide was founded by philanthropy. Almost 150 years later, its contributions to quality of life, advancement of knowledge and training of highly-skilled professionals extend across the world.

Its cornerstone is the University Library, collecting, cataloguing and providing the published scholarship that in turn becomes the foundation of research, and aligns education with the creativity and power of research.

In 1900, the South Australian Governor, Lord Tennyson, declared the Library "... is becoming one of the finest in the colonies ..." owing to the generosity of Mr Barr Smith. This legacy still touches students as we honour our past and embrace an exciting future for libraries in the 21st century.





THE BARR SMITH FAMILY

The Library's beginnings in the Mitchell Building were humble.



The University Calendar 1878 reported just 324 titles and 500 volumes. Most of these were donated, as the Library's annual budget was a mere £150. The Library also attracted significant monetary gifts to build its collection.

Adelaide businessman and philanthropist, Robert Barr Smith (1824-1915) was a member of the University Council for 19 years. He was also a great bibliophile and regularly added 20 books each month to his personal library. Barr Smith's concern for the University's capacity to compete with the best in the world, "...without the resources of older institutions with long accumulations of wealth in the Mother Land or the millionaire-endowed universities of America", resulted in ongoing donations to the University totalling £21,400, including £9,000 to the Library.

In recognition of these gifts, the University named the Barr Smith Library in 1899. After the death of Robert's wife, Joanna Barr Smith (1835-1919), the Barr Smith Family gave £11,000 to fund further collections. This generosity continued to characterise the next generation as Joanna and Robert's son, Thomas Elder Barr Smith, donated £35,000 to fund the iconic Barr Smith Library building. Designed by Adelaide architect Walter Bagot, it remains a revered and cherished study space for University of Adelaide students past and present.

At the opening of the building in 1932, the Chairman of the Library Board, Professor Wilton, acknowledged that the Library "... will stand as a priceless memorial to the Barr Smith family, and be of inestimable value." Just as the Library continues to inspire students, the Barr Smith family's generosity has stood as an exemplar for successive endowments and donations.

CONTRIBUTING TO A LIBRARY LEGACY

The Barr Smith Library, with its remarkable heritage reading room, is the physical heart of the University. It is a home to all students, to study, listen to music, access in-demand textbooks, be awed by manuscripts, make serendipitous discoveries while browsing and simply to take time off from their studies.

Today, the Library also transcends its physical boundaries, providing access to millions of virtual pages of digital resources, from recently published articles to digitised 19th century letters, circulating from the heart to every student and staff member.

The work of the Library would not be possible without the generous gifts of past and present benefactors. These gifts allow the Library to continue to provide excellent services and resources to our students, researchers, and teaching staff. There is a breathtaking diversity and complexity around the resources to support globally significant research from electronic journals whose virtual pages convey the latest findings to researchers, accessible any time anywhere, to the rarest and most fragile publications serving as a time capsule of meaning and beauty.

The Library is also home to the University Archives, our institutional memory recording the growth of South Australia's first University, established when the colony numbered just 200,000. In addition to the Archives, the Library serves as custodian and curator for the University's diverse cultural collections, from artworks to scientific instruments and a myriad of other artefacts, used to support research and teaching through the decades.

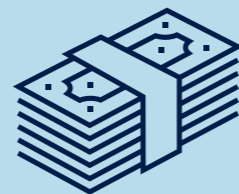
OUR CORE MISSION

A donor qualifies for the Board of Benefactors when cumulative gifts (cash or pledge) have been made in excess of \$25,000.

Membership begins at the point of commitment and brings benefits, the most important of which is an invitation to an annual event, the Board of Benefactors' *Festum*.

BARR SMITH LIBRARY ENDOWMENT FUND

The University has a proud history of philanthropy and for more than 145 years, endowments have played an invaluable role in supporting the core needs of our students and researchers, enabling them to make ground-breaking contributions to local, national and international communities.

The current Barr Smith Library endowment fund is around \$3 million and generates an important annual income contribution to the Library's budget of approximately \$150,000. Gifts to endowment are critical to sustaining and enhancing the great benefit that the University Library brings to so many.

With the availability and range of digital content exponentially expanding, the fund must grow for the purpose of permanently improving the quality and depth of the Library's collections, in particular digital collections which evolve daily.

These collections fall into two categories:

- firstly as subscriptions to journals, data and research findings, and
- secondly, historic documents or works of great importance, particularly in humanities, which should be accessible to any world class library.

The Barr Smith Library endowment fund will address both of these requirements and will, over time, make a life-changing difference to its contribution to students, researchers, the University and South Australia. The acquisition of digital resources made possible by the fund will position the Library well for future planned development of its collections and improve its reputation and position among the great University research libraries, both nationally and internationally.
