

The University of Adelaide

Since its establishment in 1874, the University of Adelaide has developed a reputation for excellence in teaching, learning and research.

Ranked in the top 1% of universities worldwide, our major strengths are agriculture, wine and food; biological sciences; environmental sciences; health sciences; information technology; physical sciences; social sciences; and telecommunications.

The University is associated with five Nobel Prize winners, has produced 104 Rhodes Scholars and 104 Fulbright Scholars, and is a member of the Group of Eight—Australia's leading research-intensive universities.

With over 3,000 staff, the University is well-equipped to provide our 22,000+ students with not only a broad range of programs and student support services, but importantly, personal interaction with teaching staff.

Research and high-quality teaching have a symbiotic relationship that underpins and characterises the finest universities in the world. This fundamental principle of the University's vision drives us in our delivery of a first-class student experience.

At the University of Adelaide we are committed to developing quality graduates, recognised internationally for their leadership, creativity and ability to influence positive change.

AN INTERNATIONAL OUTLOOK

The University of Adelaide is strongly committed to international education, admitting its first international students more than 60 years ago.

Today, over 6,000 international students from more than 90 countries make up approximately 28 per cent of the student population. This includes students enrolled at the Ngee-Ann Adelaide Education Centre in Singapore through a partnership forged between the University of Adelaide and the Ngee-Ann Kongsi, a highly respected and long established foundation actively involved in educational, cultural and welfare activities in Singapore.

A truly international outlook requires engagement, and the University has many formal agreements for student and staff exchange, research collaboration and other forms of cooperation with leading universities, research institutes and academies around the world.

The University of Adelaide's international students account for 28 per cent of international enrolments at all South Australian higher education providers.

PROGRESSIVE INSTITUTION

The University of Adelaide has always been one of Australia's most progressive institutions. It was the first Australian university to admit women to academic programs—in 1881—ahead of the UK's Oxford (1920) and Cambridge (1948).

The University has an impressive female alumni, including Laura Margaret Fowler, Australia's first woman surgeon; Helen Mayo, the first woman elected to a university council in Australia; and Dame Roma Mitchell, the first Australian woman to be a Queen's Counsel, South Australian Supreme Court Judge, Chancellor of an Australian university and Governor of an Australian State.

The University of Adelaide was also the first Australian university to grant degrees in science, and the first to establish a Conservatorium of Music.



QUALITY FACILITIES AND RESOURCES

The University of Adelaide is one of the best-resourced higher education institutions in Australia. With a blend of traditional sandstone and innovative infrastructure, we offer a wide range of facilities, including modern lecture theatres, state-of-the-art laboratories and computer suites, and an outstanding library with over two million items.

The University's strong reputation for providing quality face-to-face instruction is backed up by excellent electronic resources, including universal student email, wireless internet access, online enrolment, worldwide database access and extensive online teaching tools.

OUTSTANDING RESEARCH

The University is one of the most research-intensive universities in Australia on the basis of per capita research grant income. Learning and teaching is supported by the latest findings, with our lecturers also being active researchers in their fields.

Renowned for our research in many globally relevant areas, the University has major strengths in: agriculture, food and wine; plant and animal biotechnology; climate change and sustainability; biodiversity and ecology; natural resource management; water quality; reproductive health and early childhood development; men's health; infectious diseases; ageing; neurosciences; oral health; molecular biosciences and gene analysis; high-performance computing; defence research; physics; optics and photonics; ion chemistry; systems engineering; signals and image processing; geology and geophysics; fluids and combustion; and the social sciences including demography, migration and workforce development.

The University has important national alliances through its involvement in 11 Cooperative Research Centres (national research centres that bring together Australia's top researchers to work on projects of national and international significance).

We also participate in other research collaborations with publicly funded research agencies such as the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO) and the Defence Science and Technology Organisation (DSTO).

In addition, the University is home to a significant number of specialised Research Centres and has recently moved to establish six major Research Institutes, a number of which are in partnership with government and industry. With a research community of approximately 1,200 staff and students, the Research Institutes will bring together world-leading researchers supported by modern infrastructure and an innovative culture, to tackle state and national research priorities.

Singapore

The University of Adelaide's partnership with the Ngee-Ann Adelaide Education Centre (NAAEC) in Singapore enables us to offer a growing range of postgraduate and undergraduate programs.

The Centre is located in the stately Teochew Building on Tank Road in central Singapore. Dedicated facilities for students in the completely renovated building include multimedia equipped lecture rooms, a student computer network with internet access, computer-equipped syndicate rooms, a computer laboratory, a student lounge and private study rooms.

NORTH TERRACE CAMPUS

Renowned for its beauty, convenience and lively atmosphere, the North Terrace campus is situated next to Adelaide's central business and shopping district, and backs on to the River Torrens, playing fields and parklands. It is the University's main campus, and the site of most teaching departments and many research facilities.

The campus is also home to some of Adelaide's most significant buildings, including the historic Mitchell Building, with its elegant stained glass and fine stonework; Elder Hall, a popular venue for concerts and public lectures; and Union House, the social hub of campus, with cafés, a bar, a bookshop and a fitness centre. The University also manages the National Wine Centre of Australia, a state-of-the-art tourism and educational facility only a few minutes' walk from campus.

Easily accessible by bus, train and various foot and bike paths, the North Terrace campus is situated adjacent many South Australian attractions including the State Library of South Australia, the Adelaide Festival Centre, the South Australian Museum, the Art Gallery of South Australia, the Adelaide Zoo, and the Adelaide Botanic Gardens.

In 2010 a new \$100 million Engineering, Computer and Mathematical Sciences building opened on the North Terrace campus.



WAITE

The impressive Waite campus, established in 1924, has developed into the most powerful agricultural teaching and research centre in the Southern Hemisphere. Situated just eight kilometers south of the city centre, it comprises major teaching and research facilities located within the 174-hectare grounds.

The Waite campus provides a fertile learning environment for scientific studies relevant to agriculture, food, wine, and management of natural resources. Our activities on the campus are associated with the School of Agriculture, Food & Wine, which is based at Waite, but also uses facilities on the Roseworthy campus for its teaching.

A number of other organisations, including the South Australian Research and Development Institute (SARDI), the Australian Wine Research Institute (AWRI), several divisions of the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO), and the Australian Centre for Plant Functional Genomics (ACPGF), are also located on campus, creating the largest concentration of agricultural research scientists in Australia.

ROSEWORTHY

Roseworthy campus, Australia's first agricultural teaching and research centre, was established in 1883.

The 1600-hectare campus is situated 50 kilometres north of Adelaide and 10 kilometres from Gawler, adjacent the Barossa Valley. A shuttle bus service connects Roseworthy campus with the North Terrace and Waite campuses.

The campus has excellent teaching and laboratory facilities set on a large dryland farm. With its own student accommodation, childcare centre, café, tavern, swimming pool and many other recreational facilities, Roseworthy is not only a university campus, but a small community.

A range of animal production resources offer teaching resource support for animal-based academic programs, including Animal Science and Veterinary Science. These cover beef cattle, sheep, pigs, poultry, pasture management, cropping and a feed mill. The campus is the home of South Australia's first Veterinary Science program, which includes new teaching facilities and veterinary health centres.

The Roseworthy campus is also home to the Cooperative Research Centre (CRC) for an Internationally Competitive Pork Industry, as well as a number of units of the South Australian Research and Development Institute (SARDI). Construction of an aquaculture biosecurity research facility is also underway as a joint venture between the University and SARDI.

THEBARTON

Thebarton campus is a dedicated research and development park that stimulates vital interaction between the University and Australian business and industry.

Located on the banks of the River Torrens close to the Adelaide Entertainment Centre, four kilometres west of the city, the campus hosts a number of applied research activities in areas including mechanical engineering, physical sciences, electronic engineering, chemical engineering and occupational health. Commercial enterprises include businesses involved in materials engineering, biotechnology, environmental services, information technology, industrial design, laser/optics technology, health products, engineering services, radar systems and telecommunications.

In addition to establishing enduring partnerships with industry tenants, the campus provides a physical and program base for the development of student projects and skills into new business enterprises as part of the Graduate Entrepreneurial Program. The Program assists graduates with an innovative idea for a product, process or service to commence a business, or links graduates with small- to medium-sized companies to develop innovative ideas.

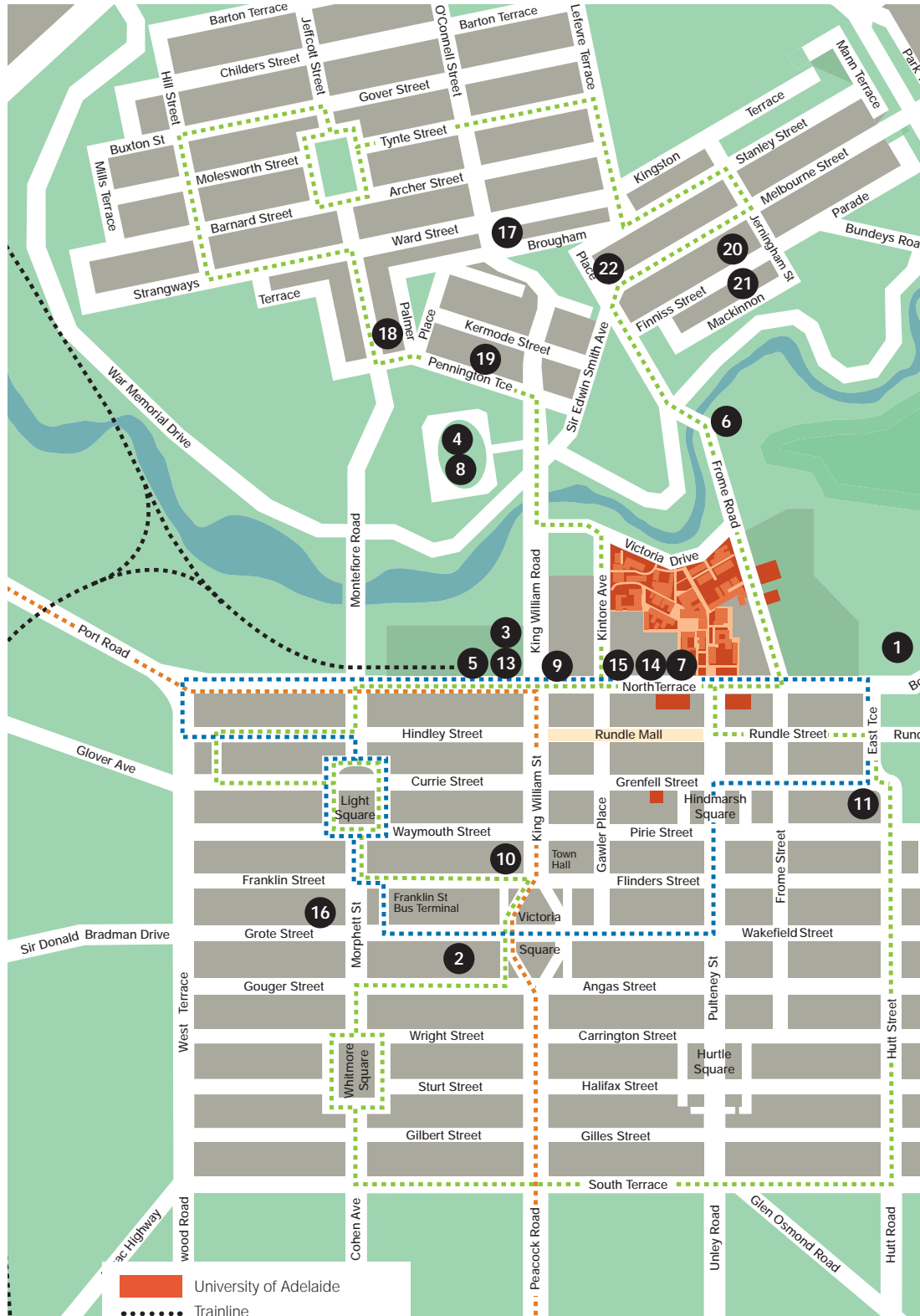

Postgraduate Coursework Programs

Postgraduate coursework study enhances your career prospects, allows you to pursue a special interest and is sometimes required for professional accreditation.

The University of Adelaide offers students a wide range of postgraduate coursework programs to study. Entry pathways are extremely flexible and you can choose to study single courses (subjects) or you can undertake a Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma or Masters degree.

Coursework programs

Graduate Certificates and Graduate Diplomas

Graduate Certificates and Graduate Diplomas are coursework awards offered by many areas in the University. They may provide a professional qualification; or they may be of an introductory nature, providing a pathway for further studies in a particular area.

Masters by Coursework

A Masters by coursework degree is defined as a program of study that has a coursework component of two thirds or more.

Entry points for postgraduate coursework programs

Coursework programs vary in length:

- » Graduate Certificates: normally one semester
- » Graduate Diplomas: normally two semesters

- » Masters degrees by coursework: normally one to two years
- » Masters degrees comprising combination of research and coursework: normally two years full-time.

Industry-linked, short academic programs are available in many specialist disciplines. Where part-time study options are available, time taken to complete the program will vary accordingly.

Entry requirements for postgraduate coursework students

Most postgraduate coursework programs require a Bachelor degree or equivalent qualification from an approved institution for admission. Some programs accept successful completion of Graduate Certificates or Graduate Diplomas.

The table on page 20 of this prospectus gives an overview of the postgraduate coursework programs we offer. Applications

Applications for most programs should be made online via the South Australian Tertiary Admissions Centre (SATAC) GradStart website; closing dates vary and are also indicated on the website: www.satac.edu.au/uniweb

A small number of programs, including online programs, require applications to be submitted directly to the relevant Faculty/School or University unit. To obtain an application form, check the application details in the table on pages 20 to 26 and refer to the contact details at the end of this Prospectus, or contact the Student Centre.

Tuition fees

Postgraduate coursework programs are offered as either Commonwealth Supported places or full fee-based enrolment places.

A Commonwealth Supported place is subsidised by the Government, with the student making a contribution to the cost of tuition. In a full fee-based place the student pays the total tuition fee to the University.

The Commonwealth Government has two Higher Education Loan Programs that assist with paying tuition fees. Generally students in Commonwealth

Supported places can access HECS-HELP, whilst full fee-based place students may be eligible for assistance with their fees through FEE-HELP. In most cases the student is able to defer payment. To determine eligibility and to learn more about this assistance visit the website: www.goingtouni.gov.au

Students who enrol in courses (subjects) not required for the completion of their degree may be required to pay non-award fees. The rates for these fees are available from the Student Centre (refer to contact details at the end of the prospectus). FEE-HELP cannot be used for payment of non-award fees.

Invoices and payments

Invoices are provided online and students are advised via their student email account when invoices are available. Information included with the online invoice will explain due dates for payment and payment methods.

Coursework programs are administered by the Faculty/School that teaches the program and student matters are managed by the Faculty/School office. Students should refer to their Program Coordinator for advice and support in study-related matters.

RENOWNED ALUMNI

1. Dame Roma Mitchell was the first Australian woman to be appointed as an Australian Supreme Court Judge, Chancellor of an Australian university, and Governor of an Australian State. She was also the founding Chair of the Australian Commission for Human Rights.

2. Dr Ines Atmosukarto completed a PhD in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology in 2001. She was awarded an Australian Alumni Award for Research and Innovation for her dedication to finding new treatments for cancer and infectious diseases.

3. Dr Andy Thomas, Mechanical engineering graduate, was Payload Commander aboard the space shuttle Endeavour in 1996. He was chosen by NASA for the Shuttle-Mir research project, and is now Deputy Chief of the Astronaut Office.

4. Sir Douglas Mawson was associated with the University for 50 years, including 31 years as Professor of Geology and Mineralogy. An early Antarctic explorer, he was a member of the first team to reach the South Magnetic Pole in 1912.
