Program overview: These two-year Masters programs are designed to provide advanced coursework leading to professionally-recognised planning qualifications. The program has a strong foundation in ecological, social and economic sustainability as a basis for planning.

It also emphasises skills in communication and collaboration with local communities and professional groups. The program employs a combination of

lectures, tutorials, intensive workshops and studio activity, including urban design studios.

Assessment: Based on project work rather than on examinations. Details of all assessment tasks and the weighting of each are contained in the course guide for each course. Some courses contain assessment hurdles. These are components that must be passed to pass the course overall. All assessment practices within these Masters programs are based on and conform to the University's assessment policy.

Likely careers: Graduates should find employment in government and private practice as urban designers, planners, project administrators or project managers.

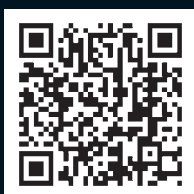
