### New Committee 2010-2011

The guest speaker at the AGM was Rose Mitchell who gave a very interesting talk on Mary Cudmore. Mary and Daniel Cudmore arrived in Adelaide in 1837 from Ireland after a year in Van Diemans Land. During the next thirty years, when Daniel took up sheep runs near Port Augusta and later along the Murray and Darling Rivers, it was a very hard life for Mary looking after the family in circumstances which included the shearing area also being used as the living quarters. What a joy it would have been for her when they bought 'Hartley Bank' at Glen Osmond in 1865, rebuilding it and renaming it 'Claremont'.

Rose also gave an interesting account of the earlier history of 'Hartley Bank' and the role of its first owner Alfred Hardy in the initial settlement of Adelaide.

Mary and Daniel lived at 'Claremont' until their deaths in the early 1890's. In 1913 Peter Waite bought the property to add it to the estate he was to leave to the University of Adelaide. Until recent, staff of the Waite and University lived at 'Claremont'. Rose finished her presentation showing pictures taken when she and Lynette Zeitz recently visited 'Claremont' and discussed the challenge ahead for some appropriate preservation of this important historical site

## Manager's Musings Autumn highs and lows

One of the very enjoyable aspects of being the Manager of Urrbrae House is that I get to welcome community groups as visitors to the house. Given Peter Waite's interest in and purchase of



early motor vehicles, I was particularly pleased to be able to talk about Peter Waite and the history of Urrbrae House at the March meeting of the Veteran Car Club of South Australia which caters for those interested in cars and motorcycles manufactured prior to January 1919. This club (whose membership co-incidentally includes Dudley Pinnock, a former professor at the Waite Agricultural Research Institute) subsequently visited Urrbrae House on 7 March on one of their monthly road runs, during which members can "stretch the legs" of their favourite veteran car or motorcycle. It was a wonderful sight to see our driveway filled with veteran cars.

As foreshadowed in the last newsletter, restoration work has been continuing in Urrbrae House. A new site manager, Evan Kellaris, was appointed in February by Built Environs to oversee this work. Evan has been extremely helpful, working with us to minimise disruption to our booked events while the restoration work is undertaken. One of the recent highs has been the completion of the conversion of the former photocopying room as a new Reception Office. Amanda will be moving into her new light-filled office this month. Additionally, repairs to the cracked ceilings and repainting of the eastern passageways on the ground floor have been completed. What a difference this has made to the aesthetics of these areas. Work is continuing on the roof and gutters on the eastern side of the house and above the Main Hall.

Unfortunately, the vagaries of our autumn weather produced one of the lows of this month. A heavy, windy downpour on 4 May resulted in water damage to two of the ceiling paper panels on the southern side of the Main Hall. Immediate action was taken to minimise the impact of the water with valuable advice being provided by heritage consultant, Kate McDougall, and Eugene Taddeo from Artlab Australia. Conservation work will be undertaken by Artlab on the ceiling papers once the current building work above the Main Hall is completed.

### Friends of Urrbrae House Committee

The Friends' AGM with its election of new office bearers and committee members is always a time of mixed emotions: sadness as people leave and happy anticipation as others step forward to join the Committee. Address at AGM by Dr Bill Wallace, President 2007 – 2010.

In the mid 1960's, as a student in plant physiology at Queen's University in Belfast I read frequently about research work at the Waite Agricultural Research Institute, in particular the work of Arthur Petrie, Les Paleg and Lance May. Fortunately I was later able to gain a Post Doctoral Fellowship and subsequently a lectureship in the Department of Agricultural Biochemistry at the Waite.

Coming from the green hills of Ireland I have still to find the 'Glen' in Glen Osmond but have been very privileged to be part of the broad range of research on Agricultural Science on the Campus and enjoy the friendly camaraderie between staff and students, with many of the graduate students coming from a broad range of overseas countries.

When a PhD student at Queen's and attending conferences in England I met Harold Woolhouse and was challenged by his penetrating questions on the validity and significance of the papers that students like myself were presenting. Since we had a similar research interest, Harold became a close friend and I was very pleased when the accepted the position of Director of the Waite Institute in 1990.

I admired Harold for the way he refocused the vision of the Waite Institute within the funding limitations of the period and national reorganisation of the University structures that was occurring. As Friends of Urrbrae House we will forever be grateful to Harold for designating the Urrbrae House Precinct and setting in motion procedures for appointment of Curators of the House and Arboretum and gardens as well as setting up Friends Groups.

Thus set against the initial vision of Peter Waite, his very generous benefaction to establish the Waite Agricultural Research Institute, the privilege of spending most of my career at the Institute plus the new challenges Harold Woolhouse gave us I have been keen to make the best contribution possible in the past three years as President of the Friends of Urrbrae House.

We are very fortunate to have such a unique venue for our functions and whether it be the Twilight Concert Series, a bush dance or a games day for children and their families a key part for all who attend is the enjoyment of being in such a magnificent mansion. Those performing at our concerts comment very favourably on the acoustics and ambience of the Drawing Room and the appreciation expressed for their performance by the audience.

In October we had a musical afternoon treat in the Ballroom when the Lumina Vocal Ensemble, an a cappella choir treated us, with one of the two concerts to celebrate their 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary; a performance of mediaeval, early renaissance and contemporary repertoire.

The past year has been very successful one with most of our events booked to capacity and I would like to acknowledge the willing work of all the committee members in the planning of these and ensuring they run smoothly. There is a great atmosphere in the Entrance Hall before the Twilight Concerts and an important contributing factor to this is the welcome from members of the Committee and refreshments provided.

From the profit of our events we have been building up reserves for a major project in the planning; the renovation of two of the bedrooms in the lower level; one of these as a bedroom of a 12 year old in 1892, the age that Eva the youngest Waite child was in that year. Meantime we have contributed funds to the restoration of the bell system and colour reproductions of the original elevation drawings for Urrbrae House.

During the year we were greatly saddened by the sudden death of our Committee Secretary Graham Campbell. We greatly miss his carefully considered opinions, wisdom and humour. I would like to thank Joy Middleton for taking over as acting Secretary.

I also wish to acknowledge the support and encouragement I had from Elma Lippett as Vice President, the thorough work Lyn MacKay does as Treasurer and the creativity of Vicki Cheshire in making our Newsletter interesting.

As we move to elect our committee for the year ahead I wish to acknowledge the valued service of two of our members who have indicated they are not available for re-election:

David Bailey has been a member of the committee since 2003 during which time he was a very willing helper at social events and doing so in style at the drinks table.

Colin Jenner has been a member of the committee since 1998 and prior to that a member of the Urrbrae House Management Committee that set up the new structures for the use of Urrbrae House. Colin's extensive link with Urrbrae House as well as his continuing link with the Faculty meant he could maintain a good overview of the Work of the Committee with respect to the Faculty and University.

### An experience as a volunteer (or from aprons to newsletters)

I came to be involved in volunteering at Urrbrae House through a friend (Janet Miller) who spoke about setting up the Schools' program. # Use of the Urrbrae Estate by the 28th Battery of the 6th Field Artillery Brigade in 1915

In the November Newsletter (2009) we posed the question as to why an Honor Roll for the 18th Battery of the 6th Field Artillery Brigade was on display in the Billiard Room at Urrbrae House.

In July 1915 the 2nd Division of the Australian Imperial Forces was being formed in Egypt and required an artillery component.

A battery, to be known as the 18th Battery / 6th Field Artillery Brigade, was formed in South Australia. This was the first and only complete Field Artillery Battery to go on active service from South Australia.

Lt Col David Brook, who has studied the history of the above artillery unit, has now provided us with the following information on Peter Waite's early association with it.

"Mitcham Camp site, now the suburb of Colonel Light Gardens was established soon after the outbreak of World War 1 and extended quite a way to the east, particularly the training area as distinct from the accommodation site. When the 18th Battery was formed, it required a larger area because of the need for horse lines and stabling, a gun park and manoeuvre area apart from the normal troop tent lines, kitchens, messes, latrines and ablution blocks. Initially the battery was located in the SE section of the camp but on 3rd September 1915 it moved to Peter Waite's property. The unit history just states that it moved to Glen Osmond and quarters were in the old stables, coach houses and the lofts."

Thus we can assume that the Honor Roll for the first year in service of the 18th Battery / 6th Field Artillery Brigade in Europe was presented to Peter Waite in appreciation of the use of his estate. There is also a photograph of the artillery unit on display in the Billiard Room. When David Brook and his wife Jan recently visited Urrbrae House he told us the photograph, one he had not seen, was taken prior to the Artillery Unit leaving for Egypt from Melbourne on 22<sup>nd</sup> November 1915.

In the earlier Newsletter item on the Honor Roll it should have been acknowledged that Richard Wells framed it so it could be displayed in Urrbrae House.

#### Oscar Jones: 1928 - 2010

Oscar Jones who died on 5<sup>th</sup> April, aged 82, was the Chief Administrative Officer of the Waite Agricultural Research Institute from 1971 until the merger with Roseworthy Agricultural College in 1991. He then served as the Registrar of the Waite and Roseworthy Campuses until his retirement in 1993. Oscar spent his childhood at Harrow, Middlesex in England and won a scholarship to Oxford graduating in 1949 with a BA (Honours Mathematics) and then an MA in 1953. He had a long and distinguished career in the educational section of the Royal Navy between 1949 and 1967 rising to the rank of Commander. As a former Friend of Urrbrae House, Oscar's piano playing at functions is recalled with much pleasure.

We extend our sympathy to his wife Barbara and their family.

## As Time Goes By

#### Handel At Urrbrae

If ever there is an instrument that so suits the ambience of Urrbrae House it is the harp.

At the Twilight Concert on 19<sup>th</sup> April, American trained Suzanne Handel, Principal Harpist, Adelaide Symphony Orchestra was joined by Elder Conservatorium flautist. Assoc Prof Elizabeth Koch OAM and ASO violinist, Minas Berberyan for an enchanting programme of mainly French chamber music.

The programme comprised Jacques Ibert's [ 1890-1962] "Deux interludes", the "L'enfance du Christ" by prolific composer, writer and atheist, Hector Berlioz [1803-69] who once

said of equally prolific Camille Saint-Saens [1835-1921] 'He knows everything, but lacks inexperience'. Minas and Suzanne gave a marvellous rendition of Saint-Saens' "Fantaisie in A for violin and harp Op. 124" which was followed by the ensemble playing "Morceau de Concours" by Gabriel Faure [1845-1924]. Faure had been an organ student of Saint-Saens and like his master was a composer, organist, pianist and teacher.

The concert concluded with a tour de force, the "Suite for flute, violin and harp, Op.6" by Sir Eugene Goosens [1893- 1962]. Goosens was born into a distinguished European musical family, both his father and grandfather having been composers and conductors. Goosens came to Australia in 1947 after much success conducting US orchestra. He was appointed Principal Conductor, Sydney Symphony Orchestra and was concurrently Director, NSW Conservatorium of Music. he was involved in the early planning of the Sydney Opera house insisting that it be sited at Bennelong Point. Following a major personal scandal he resigned his positions and returned to England in 1956. Nevertheless, in recognition of his major contribution to music in Australia the ABC named its concert hall and recording facility in Sydney, the 'Eugene Goosens Hall' Concerts on ABC Classic FM are frequently broadcast from the hall. Goosens left a major legacy of fine music making in Australia.

The concert was arranged and presented by Vivente Music of which Minas Berberyan is the principal. Hugh McClelland

## Introducing the Friends of the Waite Conservation Reserve

Don't know where Waite Conservation Reserve is? Come on, I'll show you. Climb with me up onto the Urrbrae House roof, face Waite Road, then turn 45 degrees towards the hills. There it is – those wooded foothills immediately beyond the campus buildings. For a closer look simply drive up Hartley Grove as far as you can, enter through the gate and follow the walking trail up Wild Dogs Glen into the heart of the Reserve. Walk 5 minutes and you have amazing views back over the city; walk 10 and the city disappears with nothing to indicate there are a million people living just back over the hill.

The reserve is 147 hectares of mostly Grey Box woodland punctuated with Blue Gum and Drooping Sheoak and dissected by Red Gum creek valleys.

Grey Box is a threatened vegetation community in Australia and Waite Conservation Reserve has pretty much the biggest and best slab of it left in South Australia, of which we are all very proud!

Under the open canopy of Eucalyptus trees, the Reserve supports a fabulous abundance of native species of shrubs, ground covers and grasses. Many of these may be known to you ... Christmas bush, golden wattle, chocolate lily, native lilac, native ranunculus and kangaroo grass, to name just a few. Many others are less well known, but are ecologically important.

Along with Friends of Urrbrae House and Friends of Waite Arboretum, the Friends of Waite Conservation Reserve make up a triumvirate of Friendly groups on the University of Adelaide's Waite campus.

The FWCR are a bunch of good-looking, healthy outdoorsy types fit from climbing hills to control weeds, plant trees and conduct other environmental restoration works.

We warmly invite you to join us on our fortnightly working bees from 9am-12 noon on the first Saturday and third Sunday of each month or at other events – either as a "hands on" visitor, or, if you prefer, as a quiet observer. If you care to phone Meg Byrt [8274 1154] or Joe Haslam [8271 2660], they will be happy to arrange to meet and welcome you on arrival, so you don't have to front up alone.

#### Errol Mizon: 1916 - 2010
