New members are most welcome.


It is a great way to keep your 'popular reading' updated!

Ring, ring, ring





The Bell System Restoration Project at Urrbrae House has been completed and was demonstrated at the Christmas Party. Once again when the call button is pressed at either end of the dining room table the call is registered on the Dining Room Masters or Dining Room Mistress indicator on the Annunciator and a bell rings to alert the servants who would have been in the adjacent Butler's Pantry. A few other call buttons within the House have also been reactivated.

The link between a call button in the Servery and the Main Hall has also been restored, as would have been used by the Servants to summon the Waite family and their guests when a meal was ready.

There were several stages in the project:

• Tracing the wiring links between call buttons and the annunciator with replacement of some of the main electrical links. In the case of the Dining Room where a wire option was no longer feasible a wireless link was used.

(We think Peter Waite would have approved of taking advantage of new technology as appropriate.)

- Restoration of the annunciator including reconstruction of some of the indicator vanes.
- A thorough clean up and repair of the LeClanché batteries. The cleaning up of the heavily corroded batteries required careful work.
- Construction of a cabinet to display the LeClanché batteries. The cabinet where the batteries were originally kept was located above the rear stairs used by the servants, its discrete location actually the main reason why the batteries have been preserved. To make the display of these historic batteries more accessible a new cabinet has been constructed and located on a restored Servery bench.

We greatly appreciate the long period of voluntary time Bernard Arnold and Deane Kemp devoted to this project, doing initial research on the system and undertaking its renovation. We would also like to acknowledge the support of Craig Brown from Property Services.

Kate Mc Dougall who has oversight over the Heritage Buildings of the University, provided helpful guidance on the project and prepared the drawings for a new cabinet for the batteries.

The cabinet was constructed by Quentin Bay from the Furnishing section of Marleston TAFE using Western Red Cedar to fit with other furniture in the area. It is a fine piece of work. Dino Nardecchi and his students from the same TAFE area did an amazing job on restoring the wood on the Servery Bench.

Funds from the Friends of Urrbrae House were used to support the project with the main expenditure being the employment of an electrical contractor for part of the work and the construction of the cabinet for the LeClanché Batteries.

The Urrbrae House Annunciator System

Annunciator systems evolved in large houses to summon servants to the various rooms. Originally, these systems were entirely mechanical through levers and rods. In the late 19th century electric systems became available and the Urrbrae House system is typical of the early variety.

The system comprises the indicator board with two bells (one internal calls and one front door), 22 electromagnetic relays with room "flags," a LeClanché 8-cell (12 volts) battery, and bell-push switches in the various rooms, all connected in an electrical circuit.

When a servant was to be summoned, the bell-push was pressed, the bell on the indicator board sounded and the corresponding "flag" dropped to appear in a window in the glass front, showing which room required attending. In responding, the servant reset the "flag" by pushing a rod on the side of the board.


There is also a large bell located in the foyer. This was to call the gentry to the dining room. It is operated from a bell-push next to the servants' dining room door.

The LeClanché battery was invented by French engineer Georges LeClanché in 1866. It was a primary electrical cell (in contrast to re-chargeable batteries). It generates a nominal 1.5 volts per cell. The electrolyte was ammonium chloride solution in water with a carbon electrode (positive) and a zinc electrode (negative). It required maintenance by replacing water evaporation, and periodically, a fresh solution and replacement of the eroded zinc electrodes. Modern "dry" cell batteries are made on the LeClanché principle.

Volunteer Profile: Hazel Douglas

I joined the committee of the Friends of Urrbrae House in 2009, having worked at the Waite Institute from 1981-85 as secretary to Oscar Jones who was the Secretary of the Institute. It was a job I loved and those were perhaps the halcyon days at the Waite, a great place to work with the full range of characters – amenable, difficult, amusing and dour – from academic staff to postgrads, farm workers and the admin team. And what a setting! Driving up that long drive from Fullarton Road was like going to the countryside for the day. Urrbrae House housed the student canteen in the basement and the staff club on the first floor and many were the lunches, sometimes with speakers and even 'themed' lunches, like Bastille Day when we dressed for the occasion. Such a memorable 4 years, so I felt I should give something back now and joining the committee seemed a good choice, since with a job I am not available for other volunteer activities during the day.



As to my life, I was born on the West Coast of Scotland, at the age of 10 went to the equivalent of St Trinians in North Wales, worked in London, then 4 years in East Africa after which I came to Adelaide in the early 70s. In 1980, after 4 years with what was then the Children's Hospital, I worked in Darwin (drove there), then in Weipa (more driving and there was no actual road) then back to Adelaide and the Waite. After leaving in 1985 it was back to Queensland and Cairns for 2 years. Off again in 1987 and back to England until 2002 when, encouraged by Sue and Bryan Milligan (retired Asst. Farm Manager) who visited me in Cheshire in the seemingly endless rain, I came back to Adelaide. I've done 43 moves, admittedly some of them only into short term accommodation, but nevertheless packing and unpacking – you learn never to pack the kettle.

Initially my training was in Business Management and Administration but in fact I've done all sorts of things, a huge variety of jobs from hospital, school and university admin., professional cookery, freelance magazine writing, public relations for the Jamaica Tourist Board in London, an airline and the East African Safari Car Rally in Kenya, a casino in London, and training guides and co-ordinating a tour programme for the National Trust in Cheshire where I also did 3 years re-homing dogs with the RSPCA.

It's not been dull.
