


Patron's Message

I congratulate Pam Dunsford OAM on receiving an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Adelaide. Pam was awarded a Degree of Doctor of Science (honoris causa) in recognition of her pioneering work in Australian winemaking, blazing a trail for women winemakers and championing the South Australian wine industry in a career spanning more than 40 years. Pam was the first female student to attend and graduate from the wine course at Roseworthy.

And, I congratulate Professor Kerry Wilkinson of the Department of Wine and Food for being awarded STEMM Educator of the year in the South Australian Science Excellence and Innovative Awards for her outstanding scientific contribution in life changing research in wine education.

On a sad note, Andrew Ewart, passed away recently. Andrew was a lecturer at Roseworthy Agricultural College and many alumni will remember him thorough his teaching of the Wine Technology and Sensory Evaluation subjects and his research at The Pilot Winery. Andrew was very well respected by both students and staff. He contributed significantly to the development of the wine department and the winemaking programme at a time when Roseworthy was moving from an Agricultural College to a College of Advanced Education and then to the amalgamation with the University of Adelaide. After Roseworthy, Andrew went on to build a successful career as a winemaker and a consultant. He will be remembered for the wines that he made at Mountadam winery during its early days, particularly Mountadam Chardonnay and Cabernet Sauvignon. On person note, I learnt much from Andrew during my Roseworthy days when I was beginning



my lecturing and research career. He had a 'practical outcome' focussed approach to both his teaching and research. Andrew was one of the authors of our technical books. We thank him sincerely for his contribution to our book writing endeavours. Andrew fought a long battle with cancer and other issues with positiveness and strength. Over the years Judith and I became close friends of Andrew and Helen. In recent years our friendship strengthened, perhaps through shared memories of Roseworthy while building our careers and working together on the technical books. Judith and I, Roseworthy staff and students and the winemaking community will miss Andrew's presence and contribution to our lives. We pass on our condolences to Helen, James, Simon and Mary.

Judith and I hope 2021 is a positive and rewarding year for alumni. And, for those that can attend the reunion dinner, we hope to see you in July.
