The best thing was, and is, the Barr Smith. I discovered the stacks in the very first week of lectures (in Psychology), as a humble art teacher student at the then Adelaide Teachers College (1957). Another great spot was the Carnegie Room with its wonderful classical music collection (in the Lady Symon) and friendships made there still persist.

By 1960 I was in the schools (Whyalla) with a Diploma in Art Teaching and a half-finished BA. Three more stints at Uni were yet to come. I did interrupt MA studies at Flinders to take up an Australia Arts Council grant for "the Antikythera collection" exhibition.

Career and life accomplishments

As an art teaching student, I really aspired not just to teach but to being an exhibiting artist. Eventually, I had enough work for a show but could not find gallery space. A contact in Tasmania suggested Hobart, so 1982 saw "GentleGenes" hung in Salamanca Place, with a huge media response. I had switched from paint to textiles as an artistic medium around 1977, and this first solo exhibition was in response to Richard Dawkin's "The Selfish Gene". More than a dozen solo exhibitions have followed. Highlights were having a large 'Antikythera' work bought by the Queen Elizabeth Museum and Art Gallery, Tasmania, and another work by Denver Museum, and more recently a large commission for Beach Energy, Adelaide.

I founded the Fibre Arts Network (FAN) with a view to attracting international artists to Adelaide, and amazingly this 'non-organisation' persists, and still meets regularly, arranges exhibitions, forums, and workshops with prestigious artists from just about everywhere. I happily wrote about local textile arts for the periodical TEXTILE magazine for about 20 years, an Australian publication that had a world-wide distribution.

Following first-year 1967, I won a Commonwealth Scholarship and later, a Commonwealth Postgraduate Research Award for PhD research (inventing new reactions to make synthetic plant-growth-regulators) concluding 1973.

In 1974, I joined Prof Sir Derek Barton (Nobel Laureate) at Imperial College London. The group devised reactions for converting Penicillin into Cephalosporins. In 1978, I became an ANU Research Fellow and 'lieutenant' for Professor Lewis Mander AC, FAA, FRS (formerly my PhD supervisor at Adelaide). A research high-point for me was elaborating the labile Gibberellic Acid A-ring for the GA total synthesis. I went to CALTECH in 1983 (as a Fulbright Scholar) and was impressed that top US universities collaborated with industries and venture capital companies to develop valuable new technologies. This seemed a potentially rewarding career direction. So, in summary, during the next 25 years my career evolved from being a scientist into: (a) Federal Government strategic planner for new technologies in industry, (b) Managing Director of a technology investment company, (c) Businesses Advisor on IP, technology and investment, (d) World Intellectual Property Organisation (Geneva) 'Expert' consultant (for approx.15 years) assisting developing countries modernise economies through IP creation, protection and commercialisation.

Advice to your 20-year old self

Have a vision for your future and set goals for a path that will take you closer to that vision. However, in many ways our world is evolving and your vision might have to change accordingly. Therefore keep learning new and useful things that could help you adapt and thrive in changing circumstances, some of which might be out of your control. "The scholarship formed the foundation for my career as a teacher and Council Member. It empowered me to shape my own future and was a wonderful sign that people in the community believed in me."
