Career and life accomplishments

In the 1982 drought on Eyre Peninsula, I encouraged many farmers to keep their sheep in feedlot containment areas. This was the first time this practice had been used on farms - at a time of great stress. In previous droughts sheep had been left to suffer and cause erosion in paddocks, or sold at a loss. It was a great success and is now a practice used around Australia at times of feed shortage. I surveyed the farmers involved and documented their experiences so that we all learnt for the next drought.

I published the book "Feeding Sheep" which became a best seller and is still used by farmers around Australia.

I spoke at many meetings to assist farmers and was a key speaker at the International Conference "Feeding sheep and goats" held in Brazil.

The most exciting project was "Better Breeding" where we helped farmers choose better rams and then evaluate the progeny compared to their previous rams. This project also had an impact Australia-wide.

I lead a project to encourage farmers to consider lambing at a later time. This had benefit on farm practices and also improved the flow of lambs onto the market.

University memories

I started university in 1967 aged 21, with much 'catch-up-learning' required due to back & forth family migration.

University provided a stimulating & relatively stable environment to make friends with similar interests (e.g. Science Club).

Students stopped a biochem lecture at 1.30pm 21 July 1969: we wanted to watch the (tiny black & white) TV and Neil Armstrong walk on the moon! I enjoyed the apparent mysteries of science and especially devising ways to solve problems. At the time, I didn't realise these studies would enable my future career to advance in many different but rewarding directions.

Career and life accomplishments

In 1965 and '66 I worked and studied part time alone in the UK to qualify for university. Choosing Adelaide (over London) was a pivotal decision. Following first-year 1967, I won a Commonwealth Scholarship and later, a Commonwealth Postgraduate Research Award for PhD research (inventing new reactions to make synthetic plant-growth-regulators) concluding 1973. In 1974, I joined Prof Sir Derek Barton (Nobel

Laureate) at Imperial College London. The group devised reactions for converting Penicillin into Cephalosporins. In 1978, I became an ANU Research Fellow and 'lieutenant' for Professor Lewis Mander AC, FAA, FRS (formerly my PhD supervisor at Adelaide). A research high-point for me was elaborating the labile Gibberellic Acid A-ring for the GA total synthesis. I went to CALTECH in 1983 (as a Fulbright Scholar) and was impressed that top USA universities collaborated with industries and venture capital companies to develop valuable new technologies. This seemed a potentially rewarding career direction. So, in summary, during the next 25 years my career evolved from being a scientist into: (a) Federal Government strategic planner for new technologies in industry, (b) Managing Director of a technology investment company, (c) Businesses Advisor on IP, technology and investment, (d) World Intellectual Property Organisation (Geneva) 'Expert' consultant (for approx.15 years) assisting developing countries modernise economies through IP creation, protection and commercialisation.

Advice to your 20-year old self

Have a vision for your future and set goals for a path that will take you closer to that vision. However, in many ways our world is evolving and your vision might have to change accordingly. Therefore keep learning new and useful things that could help you adapt and thrive in changing circumstances, some of which might be out of your control.

"Be optimistic and don't be afraid when you encounter problems; view these as a challenge and a learning opportunity. If necessary seek help, no one knows everything!"

"The scholarship formed the foundation for my career as a teacher and Council Member. It empowered me to shape my own future and was a wonderful sign that people in the community believed in me."


Changing lives through scholarships
