# Global Partnership Development Framework







### Introduction

The Global Partnership Development
Framework has been designed to promote
a coordinated and consistent Universitywide approach to fostering engagement
between the University of Adelaide and
international partners. These partnerships
support the University's endeavours
to increase education, research, and
student and staff mobility opportunities,
alongside enhancing our industry and
government engagement, whilst building
and extending the University's reputation
and profile internationally.

The Framework directly supports the University's Strategic Plan and the Five Pillars to Excellence, with a particular focus on Pillar #1: Connected to the Global World of Ideas.

We will seek, establish, and strengthen long-term relationships with international institutions that share our priorities in research, commercialisation and education.

Pillar of excellence #1, Future Making 2022-2023

The Framework is designed to elevate and prioritise collaboration through centralised support, coordination, and resourcing of key strategic partners that exhibit potential for broad and deep engagement, and are aligned to the University's strategic objectives and international ambitions.

The University currently has very few comprehensive global partnerships, with most arrangements focused on one activity across a limited geographical spread of countries. There is also work required to elevate our global profile and relevance. Through building comprehensive global partnerships, the University will use resources more effectively through a collaborative and targeted approach with faculties, schools, centres, institutes, and units working together to identify and build partnerships. Additionally, the University will continue to focus on servicing and sustaining existing partnerships.

With increased efficiency, the University will have greater capacity to develop deep and meaningful engagement, and improve the awareness of key global partnerships internally and externally, which will support our broad strategic aspirations.





### **Guiding Principles**

The Global Partnership Development Framework has been developed based on six central guiding principles.

### Partnership Categories

The Global Partnership Development Framework provides an approach to categorise current and potential partnerships based on a series of criteria. Partners are categorised into one of three categories: 'Flagship', 'Core' or 'Specialised'. Table 1 outlines detailed information on each partnership category including:

- 1. Characteristics (what)
- 2. Objectives (why)
- 3. Development (how).

**Flagship:** Close, multifaceted partnerships with clear opportunities for investment and collaboration in areas aligned with University, state and national strategic priorities.

**Core:** Key partners for the University's core international engagement activities of student recruitment, student exchange, collaborative Higher Degree by Research (HDR) programs and centrally facilitated research collaboration and programs.

**Specialised:** Partnerships established to support a specific collaboration or outcome.

Appendix A outlines the University's partnerships and respective category where a formal agreement exists, or where there are active discussions about establishing a partnership. The majority of University partnerships are classified as 'Specialised', followed by 'Core' and 'Flagship'.

### **Assessment**

The level of engagement with a partner is assessed through a range of criteria. This includes student and staff exchange/mobility, number of articulation student commencements, joint publications, project collaborations, research symposia

or other collaborative activities.

Additionally, information recorded through the Global Engagement Intelligence Form, an internally accessible resource from the Global Engagement website, is considered.

Consideration is also given to the future potential of partnerships and opportunities for further expansion. As relationships develop and the University identifies new links, partners may move up or down the classification system accordingly.

### Resources and Funding

Funding at a central, faculty, school, centre or institute level will be provided to support partnerships based on classification level as outlined in Table 2. A centrally developed and funded competitive Global Partnership Development Fund will be launched in 2023 that will provide support for joint

activities, initiatives and collaboration.
Faculties, schools, centres, institutes and units will be able to apply for funding to activate engagement with identified Flagship or Core partners.

Flagship partnerships will have access to the greatest level of investment, including centrally-funded initiatives, prioritised student and staff mobility programs and scholarships as well as dedicated staffing and support services through Global Engagement to drive partnership activity. Engagement and funding for Specialised partnerships will be driven by the relevant faculty, school, centre, institute or unit.

### **Global Strategy Committee**

In 2023, the University formed a new Global Strategy Committee, comprised of senior leaders from across the University, to advise, support and provide expert advice across a broad range of international activities and endeavours. The Committee will:

- Support the continued development and implementation of the University's global strategy and recruitment targets
- Champion the Global Partnership Development Framework, and encourage a coordinated approach to its implementation
- Consider mechanisms, advice, and recommendations to foster strategic engagement with international alumni, industry and government stakeholders
- Share insights on emerging trends and policy changes within the sector and provide recommendations to the Vice-Chancellor's Executive, Vice-Chancellor's Group, and other University committees as required
- Act as champions across the University to identify and drive global partner funding opportunities, and engagement initiatives, and to foster existing or new global research and education partnerships with international institutions.


### Asia Society Australia
