

Library for the Future (2023–2026)

Regardless of whether we continue as The University of Adelaide or as a merged new entity, it is imperative that the Library is positioned as a *Library for the Future*. The uncertainties of the post-pandemic environment and the merger discussions make long-term planning challenging. Therefore a set of key themes and principles have been established to underpin both long-term and short-term planning. Our key **Themes** firmly establish our priorities, and the **Principles** dictate how we will achieve them. The themes and principles are guided by the University's strategic priorities, as well as sector and future trends analysis.

Valuing Indigenous Knowledge

We are committed to being respectful champions for culturally-safe access, preservation, and promotion of Indigenous knowledge and expertise. We will take an active role in facilitating the embedding of Indigenous knowledge into the curriculum and position the Library as a place of cultural safety and discovery.

We acknowledge that this commitment is only possible through the development of meaningful relationships and partnerships with Indigenous staff, students and community members and a proactive strategy to increase the number of Indigenous staff within the Library. The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Library, Information and Resource Network (ATSILIRN) protocols will be fundamental principles.
