

Rules for Award of Degree ad eundem gradum

- 1. Admission ad eundem gradum in the University, may at the discretion of the Council be granted without examination to graduates of such universities as the Council may from time to time approve for the purpose; and to holders of qualifications deemed by the Council to be of a status equivalent to that of a degree of the University, awarded by such institutions of higher learning as the Council may from time to time approve for the purpose. Provided always that the Council shall be satisfied that any candidate under this clause has or has had a substantial association with the University, or is a distinguished visiting scholar whom the University wishes to recognise; and provided also that such evidence of the degree or other educational qualification is provided as shall satisfy the Council.
- 2. Any member of the University, or of any properly constituted faculty, board, or committee of the University or of any affiliated college or of the University Union may at any time propose in confidence to the Vice-Chancellor and President, with supporting evidence as required by Rule 1, any eligible person for admission *ad eundem gradum*.
- 3. The Vice-Chancellor and President, after due enquiry, may at his or her discretion, either recommend to the Council any person proposed for admission ad eundem gradum or refer the proposal for advice to a committee comprised of: the Vice-Chancellor and President (Convenor), the Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Vice-President (Academic) and the Chair of the Alumni Association. On receipt of advice from this committee the Vice-Chancellor and President may recommend the person proposed to the Council for admission ad eundem gradum, or not as the Vice-Chancellor and President deems appropriate.
