

GUIDE TO CHOOSING OPEN & BROADENING ELECTIVES

This guide will help you choose Open & Broadening Electives for your undergraduate degree.

Note that an **Open Elective** is a “free choice” of an elective – it can be any course provided you have met the prerequisites, is not incompatible with another course you have taken or need to take and it is allowed for you to enrol in (for example, many Law, Veterinary, Nursing and Medicine courses cannot be taken unless you are doing the degree).

A **Broadening Elective** is an elective course which is outside your primary discipline and area of study. At the present time, the Bachelor of Commerce and the Bachelor of Economics require you to complete 9.00 units of Broadening Electives. If you require guidance or advice as what is outside the discipline and/or area of study, please seek advice from the [Professions Hub](#).

HOW TO USE COURSE PLANNER

The 2021 [Course Planner](#) can be found on the University of Adelaide website under the top banner **Study at Adelaide**.

From the **2021 Course Planner** you will be able to search for all courses. To search for a specific course, enter in the Course Title (e.g. Anthropology of Everyday Life), enter the Subject Area (e.g. ANTH) and the Catalogue Number (e.g. 1104).

To search for courses in a general area that you are interested in, simply enter in a subject area [e.g. ACCTING (accounting), CLAS (classics), ECON (economics) etc.].

When you are searching courses, keep in mind the catalogue number usually indicates the level of the course. For example, the catalogue number for Level 2 electives will begin with a ‘2’. For example, ECON 2502 ‘*East Asian Economies II*’ is a Level 2 course, whilst ECON 1002 ‘*Australia in the Global Economy I*’ is a Level 1 course.

Also be aware of any prerequisite courses required for course or any incompatible courses. For example, for ECON 2504 ‘*Intermediate Econometrics II*’, you must have completed ECON 1008 or ECON 1011 or STATS 1000 or equivalent as a prerequisite to undertake the course. Likewise, you will also not be able to take the course if you have already completed ECON 2006 & STATS 2002, STATS 2003 & MATHS 2103 as it will be incompatible. Also check for any restrictions, for example ECON 2504 is not suitable for BCompSc, BCompGr or BEng(Software Engineering) students.

On the Course Planner you will also be able to see assessment, syllabus, critical dates and class details.

To enrol in courses make sure you leave the Course Planner and log on to [Access Adelaide](#), available under the **Student** banner on the University website.
