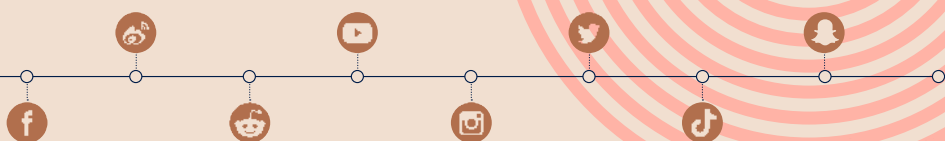

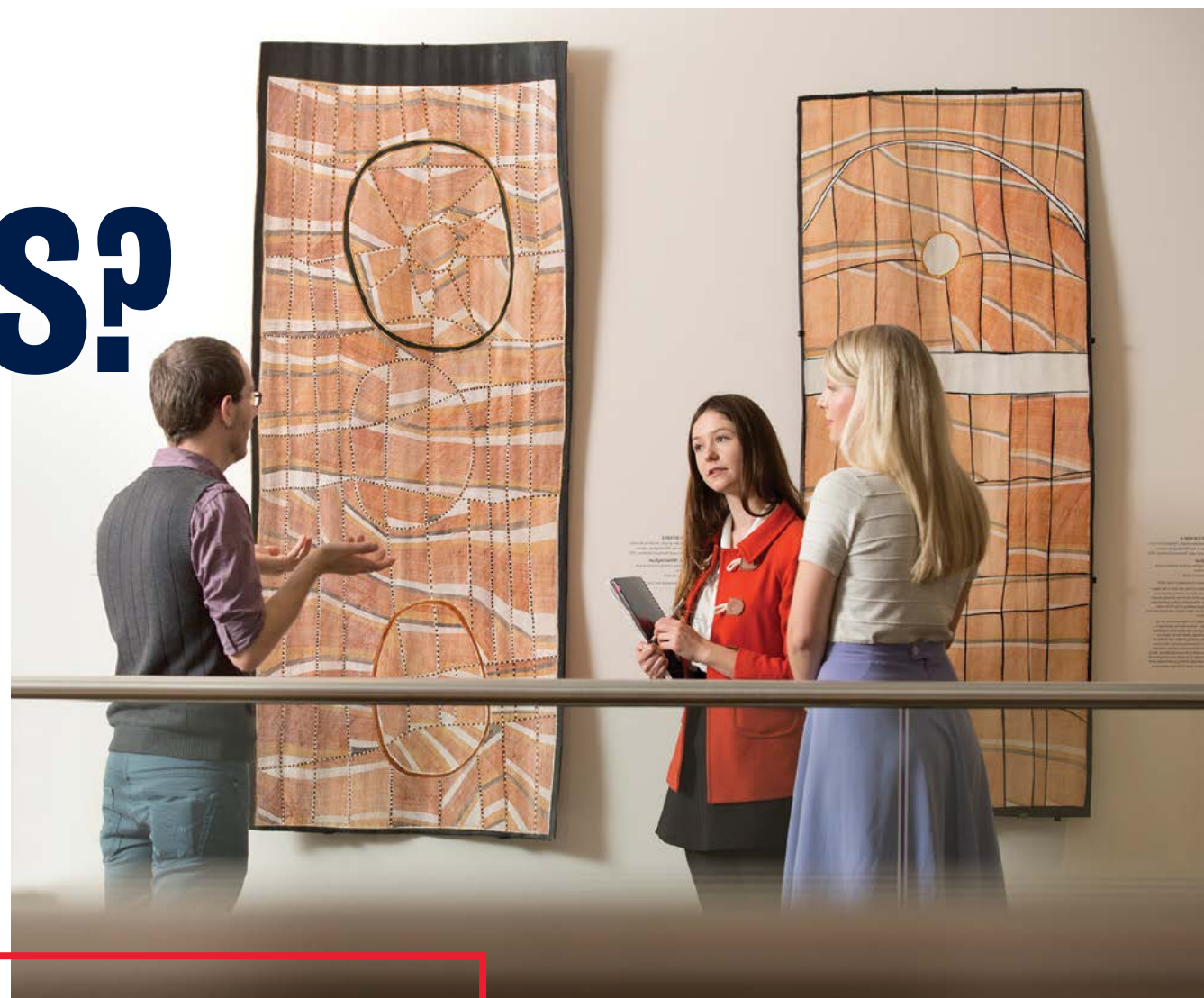
Arts internship

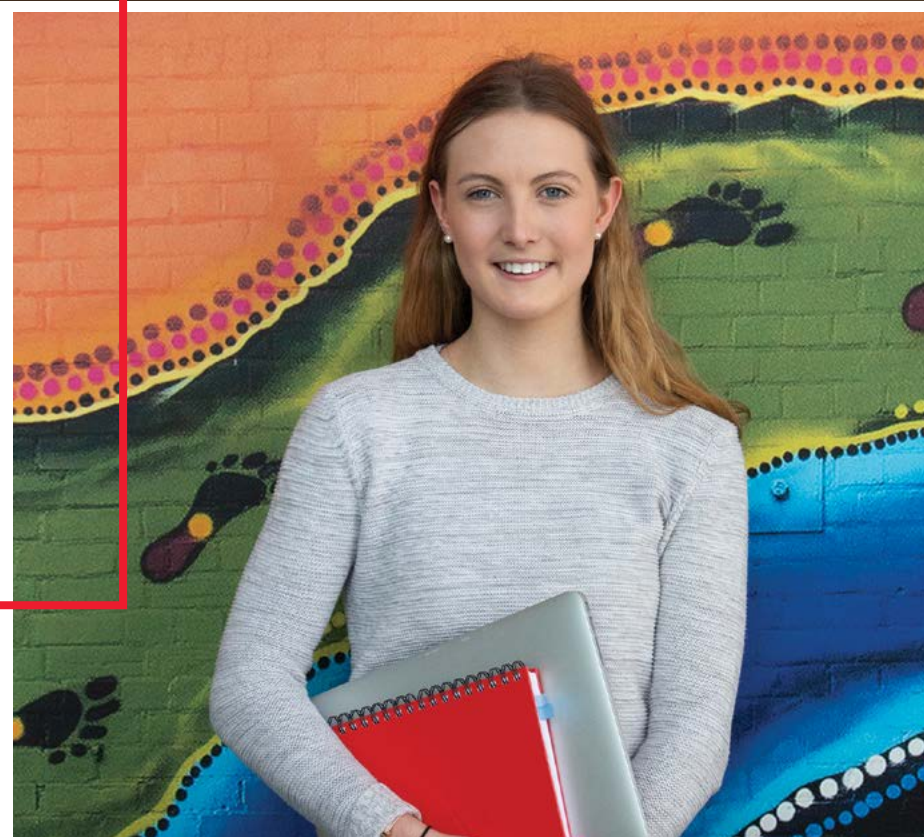

Areas we teach in the Faculty of Arts include:

Anthropology

SATAC code 334241

Study society and culture in all its variety. Anthropology helps us understand why humans have different ways of thinking, feeling and acting, and why humans as social beings similarly participate and identify in music, sport or religion.

Art History and Visual Culture

SATAC code 334251

Explore the making, meaning, reception and consumption of historical and contemporary images and objects, and develop visual literacy in the areas of analysis, critical thinking, and persuasive communication skills.

Australian Studies

SATAC code 334271

Explore Australia's past, present and future, through topics such as culture, diversity, Indigenous experience and the environment. You'll investigate complex matters of social justice, gender and human rights as they relate to Australia.

Classics

SATAC code 334291

The cultures, societies, religions, literatures and political ideas of ancient Greece and Rome have left potent legacies. In Classics courses you'll develop analytical research skills while learning about aspects of archaeology, history, art, thought, literature, society and politics from the birth of civilisation.

Creative Writing

SATAC code 334301

Get a practical introduction to creative writing and learn ways to begin and develop a sustained and reflective writing practice that includes revising and editing. The production-focused nature of this major will help you become a more proficient and versatile writer.

Criminology

SATAC code 334311

Study crime and deviance as a social phenomenon. Criminology aims to understand why people commit crimes, our social responses to it, and methods of crime prevention.

Cultural Studies

SATAC code 334321

To understand society it's important to develop critical skills to analyse how cultural practices are produced, circulated and negotiated. Explore the way we understand ourselves and others through film, social media, literature and music, fashion and objects, indigenous cultures and history, gender and sport.

Digital Humanities

SATAC code 334331

The digital revolution has only just begun. Today's young people will experience more change in their lifetimes than any previous generation of human beings. Delve deeply into the humanities and social sciences in preparation for the twenty-first century workplace.

Economics

SATAC code 334341

Investigate human behaviour and its consequences in a world with scarce resources; how the economy works in the context of global economic forces; and how governments deal with issues such as unemployment, international trade and taxation.

Education

SATAC code 334351

Interested in education, but not necessarily teaching? Studying education helps you understand the ways in which people learn and equips you with strong foundational knowledge and skills that are transferable to a wide range of educational and non-educational roles in a variety of organisations.

English

SATAC code 334361

Analyse the ways in which cultural products, including literature and film, shape our understanding of ourselves and our social contexts. You'll be given the opportunity to learn, think, and write critically about the ways literature and film both reflect and influence our world.

Film Studies

SATAC code 334901

Explore a range of theoretical, historical and critical approaches to film. Discuss origins, techniques, genre, narrative, stardom, audience, and the global film industry.

Gender Studies

SATAC code 334381

Explore how society is structured around gender and other social identities, such as class, age, race and ethnicity, and how this influences people's life experience and outcomes.

Geography, Environment and Population

SATAC code 334391

Analyse environmental processes, and human interactions within them, at local and global levels. Significant world issues are

considered, including: how the world can cope with an ever-expanding population; what future cities should be like; and how climate change will impact our planet.

History

SATAC code 334411

Investigate our human past in all its diversity. Gain a deeper understanding of the global impact of warfare, conflict, film, migration, slavery, colonialism and commodity production, political movements, religion and the law.

History and Philosophy of Science

(minor only)

Without science and its discoveries, modern life would be unrecognisable. In this minor you'll explore: how science works, and how it came to be the way it is now. You'll investigate how scientific knowledge is generated, develop your scientific literacy, and apply your understanding to practical issues arising when science is set in a human context.

Indigenous Knowledges and Society

SATAC code 334421

Explore issues of concern to Indigenous peoples, including culture, language, the environment, history and politics, and deepen your understanding of the significance and value of First Nation knowledge systems in a changing world.

International Business*

(minor only)

Understand the complex and dynamic forces that impact the global economy, and focus on specialised areas of international management and marketing.

International Development

SATAC code 334441

Examine issues related to poverty reduction and sustainable development, with a focus on the developing world. You'll debate the determinants of economic growth, causes of civil war, the nature of 'good governance', sources of environmental sustainability, links between gender and development, and the effectiveness of aid.

Languages

Languages offered include Chinese, French, German, Indonesian, Italian, Japanese, Modern Greek and Spanish. You'll gain not just written and verbal language skills, but an understanding of the culture of the society your chosen language comes from.

Linguistics

SATAC code 334471

Linguistics is the study of human language, its nature, origins and uses. You'll examine language's role in human communication, how it's learned, and how it changes over time.

Management*

(minor only)

Learn about administering and coordinating an organisation's resources efficiently and effectively. You'll also develop the skills to successfully manage changes in work structures, process and product technologies, employment relations, and organisational culture.

Marketing*

Gain a grounding in marketing theory, learn how to prepare marketing reports and plans, undertake a diagnostic case study, analyse advertisements in a variety of media, and apply market research to solve a real business problem.

Mathematical Sciences

SATAC code 334481

Develop a foundation in mathematics and statistics before specialising in applied maths, pure maths, or statistics to solve problems by collecting, analysing and modelling data.

Media

SATAC code 334491

Build a theoretical understanding of media practices, alongside practical media skills with a focus on digital and interactive media. You'll also cultivate skills in analysis, research, media writing, journalism and media technology use.

Music

SATAC code 334511

Delve into music from different genres around the world in its social and performance contexts. You'll learn about the history of music analysis, with a focus on music research.

Music Education

(minor only)

Study the essential principles and skills underlying music education in the 21st century, develop your core music teaching skills through study of key educational resource materials, and begin to build your own folio of sequential learning plans.

Philosophy

SATAC code 334521

What is reality? What is knowledge? Philosophy seeks to resolve the big questions using debate, reasoning and critical thinking to better understand the world, our place in it, and the nature of the human mind.

Politics and International Relations

SATAC code 334531

Explore political decision-making, justice and democracy. You'll learn about Australian politics and public policy, the politics of other countries, and the relations between them, and debate the burning issues in domestic and international governance.

Psychology

SATAC code 334541

Psychology is the scientific study and development of useful ways of understanding people's thoughts and behaviours. You'll study the human mind and how it works, with particular attention to behaviour, and then apply your understanding to solve practical problems.

Sociology

SATAC code 334551

Sociology is the study of the experience of everyday life, how society is organised, and the social problems that arise. Sociologists think critically and imaginatively about a wide range of social issues, exploring the assumptions behind key questions.

Double and concurrent degrees

If you have a strong interest in more than one area you can apply for a double degree, which can usually be completed in four years. Most of our degrees can be teamed with Law and can be completed in 4.5 years.

You can also combine degrees through concurrent study—enrol in the first degree, and then apply for the second at the end of semester one or first year. Discuss your enrolment with the Faculty of Arts for help in selecting the right courses.

Guaranteed entry 70

A wide range of University of Adelaide degrees now have a pre-set entry score, known as ‘guaranteed entry’, as well as a cut-off that varies each year. For guaranteed entry* into our Arts degrees, simply meet any subject prerequisites and achieve a 70 Selection Rank or above (including adjustment factors if eligible).

It’s that straightforward. If you think you might score under 70, however, don’t stress. There are still opportunities to study Arts at Adelaide.

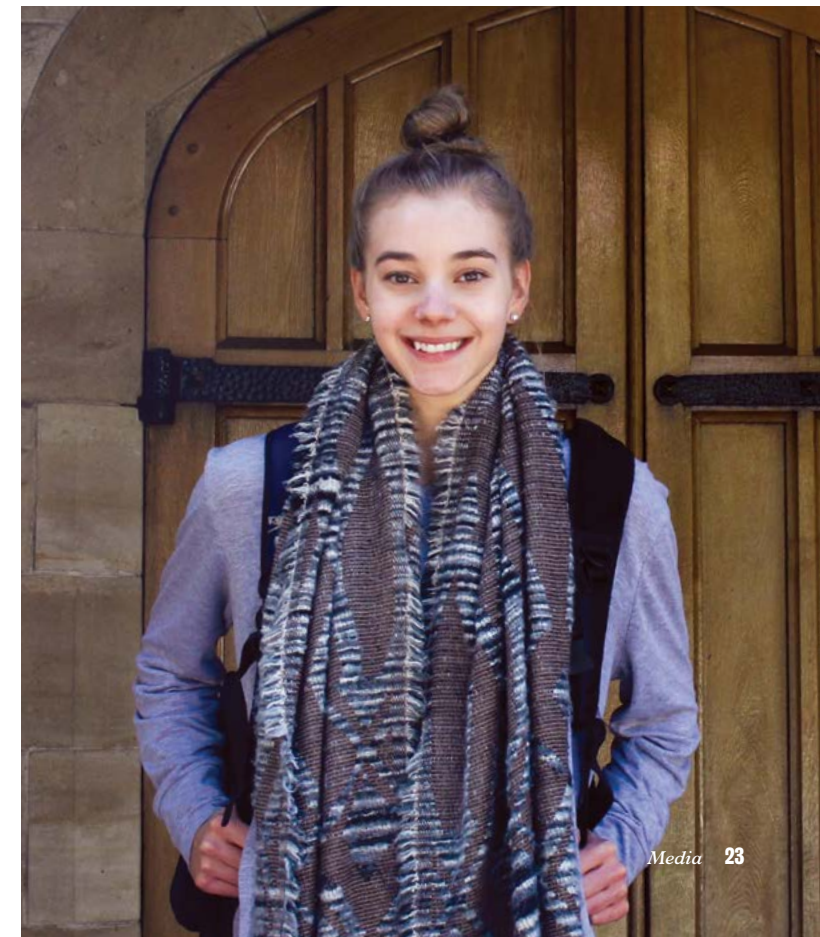

- score interpretation questions about a given short extract of piano music
- theoretical questions, such as keys, major and minor scales, intervals and chords.

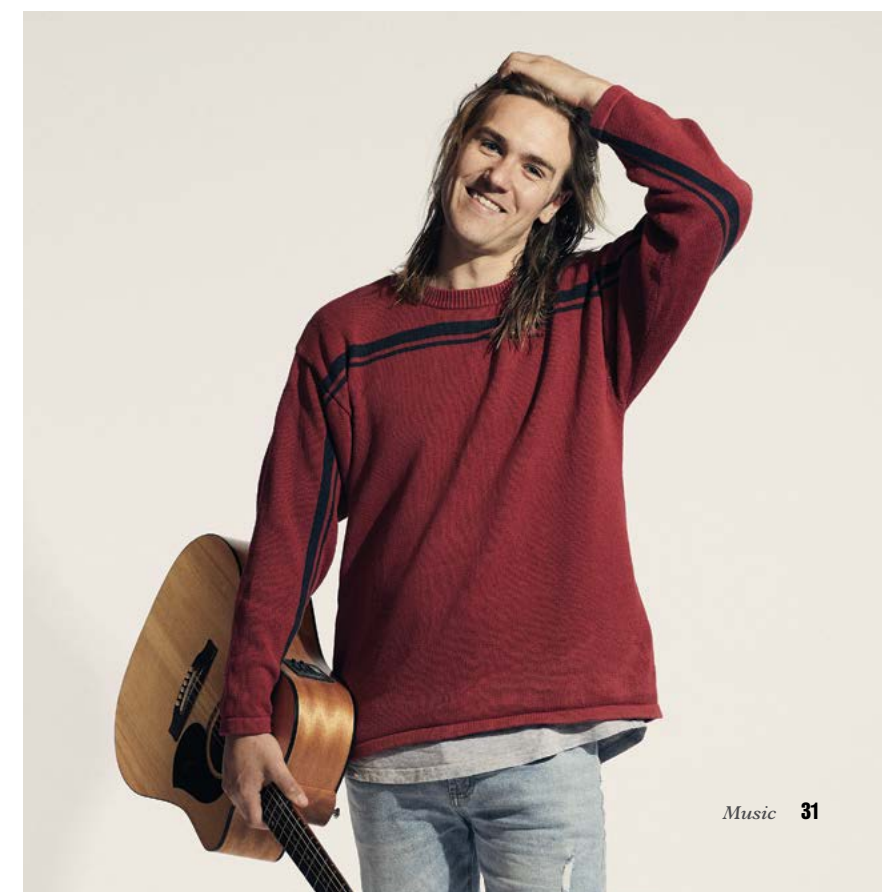

CENTRE FOR ABORIGINAL STUDIES IN MUSIC (CASM)

What is CASM?

CASM is a specialist Australian Indigenous music centre located within the Elder Conservatorium of Music. It provides specialised, tertiary-level, University-based music programs for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander musicians, and is an important centre for Australian Indigenous music production.

CASM Foundation Year

CASM offers an inspiring and engaging Foundation Year program, delivered over two semesters and providing a pathway for Indigenous Australians into university.

It includes:

- specialist music training
- access to a music recording studio
- Indigenous tutoring assistance
- preparation for further study in music and other degrees
- student accommodation service.

The Foundation Year program is HECSHELP-free, ABSTUDY-approved and is open to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians aged 17 years and over.

CASM studios

Throughout their studies, CASM students are actively involved in musical composition, performance and recording, including studio production. Much of this work is undertaken in the CASM studios, which provide state-of-the-art rehearsal and recording facilities.

Further studies at CASM

CASM offers prerequisite-free courses in Indigenous music for undergraduate students, as well as specialised research training in Indigenous music studies for honours and higher-degree-by-research students.

Careers and further study pathways

CASM prepares graduates to participate in professional life as performers, composers, arrangers, educators, researchers, sound engineers, producers, arts administrators, researchers, and more. Students regularly participate in community performance events and learn about the music industry,

developing skills useful for community development activities involving music.

Students are also prepared for ongoing study and training in a variety of fields, including: music teacher training, education, sound engineering, psychology, community development, youth work, arts management, health, linguistics, arts, theatre, media and broadcasting, visual arts and dance, and research.

Student support

CASM programs are ABSTUDY-approved, and available to students from around Australia. Studies at CASM may be taken part-time, although ABSTUDY support requires a 0.75 full-time equivalent study load. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students at the University of Adelaide can obtain support through Wirltu Yarlur Aboriginal Education, and the University's wider support services.

Individualised academic support is provided through the Indigenous Tutorial Assistance Scheme, which offers free tutorial support for Indigenous students. Wirltu Yarlur also provides student support in areas such as ABSTUDY, accommodation, financial assistance, facilities, learning support, mentoring, scholarships, and cadetships.

How to apply for CASM programs

Selection for CASM programs can take place at any time, though most applicants apply between September and January for a semester 1 start, or from June to July for a semester 2 start.

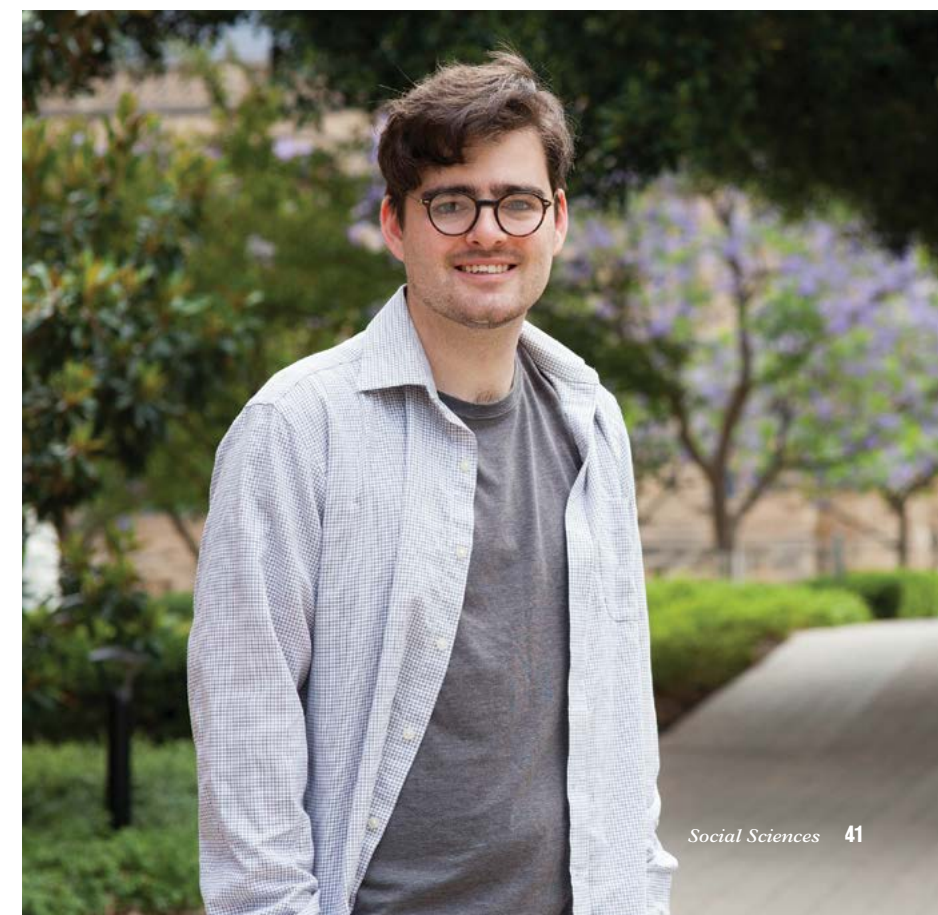

The University of Adelaide will reimburse you when you successfully complete the Literacy component of the test at your first attempt.

HECS Higher Education Loan

The Australian Parliament has recently passed amendments to the Higher Education Support Act 2003, which will affect students studying in a Commonwealth supported place from 1 January, 2021. The changes include:

- Adjusting the maximum Student Contribution amounts for different areas of study, for students commencing a new program in 2021
- Grandfathering Student Contribution amounts for continuing students
- Re-introducing the 10% HECS-HELP discount, for HECS-HELP eligible students who make an up-front payment of \$500 or more towards their Student Contribution amount
- All Commonwealth supported students, and students accessing any of the HELP loans, must provide their valid Unique Student Identifier (USI).

Student services and amenities fee

Students are charged an annual student services and amenities fee (SSAF) to assist with the funding of student services and amenities at the University. In 2021, the SSAF amount for full-time students was \$313, and for part-time students it was \$235. Fees may increase in 2022. Eligible students may defer this fee to an SA-HELP loan. Deferring your studies

Most undergraduate degrees can be deferred for up to two years. Please refer to specific degrees for exceptions.

English language requirements for international students

All international students undertaking an Australian Year 12 program are required to achieve a Pass grade or above in one of the approved English as a Second Language or English language subjects. If an applicant attempts, but does not pass, the English language subject, then alternative options, such as an acceptable English language proficiency test result, may be arranged. Successful completion of the International Baccalaureate (IB) diploma meets the English language requirements of the University of Adelaide.

Permanent residency

International students who have studied an Australian Year 12 program or the IB and expect to be granted Australian permanent residency before the commencement of their university study must contact the International Office. Visit www.international.adelaide.edu.au
