Pathways to Adelaide

These days, there's more than one pathway into university study.

It's important to take the time to explore each of the different pathways here, to ensure your child is aware of their options and able to make an informed decision as to what option may be best for them.

Selection rank (ATAR plus adjustment factors)

If your child has qualified for the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) or holds an equivalent recent year 12 qualification (including the International Baccalaureate Diploma), and achieves a competitive selection rank, they can use this as a pathway into University.

Students compete for a place with their Selection Rank (ATAR plus any applicable adjustment factors). For the majority of our undergraduate programs, a student must not have completed more than 2 years full time equivalent university study (48 units).

Some programs take additional factors into account as well as or instead of a student's ATAR, such as auditions, the UCAT, oral interviews, etc. For details on your child's program of choice, visit Degree Finder: <u>adelaide.edu.au/</u> <u>degree-finder</u>



Guaranteed entry

Whether your child has completed the International Baccalaureate or achieved an ATAR through the SACE (or equivalent), Guaranteed Entry gives them certainty when applying to study at the University of Adelaide. Most of our undergraduate degrees have a fixed entry selection rank (including adjustment factors) which means, if a student achieves that selection rank or higher and meets any additional admissions criteria such as subject prerequisites, they are guaranteed entry to that degree.

Subject-based entry

If your child did not receive a competitive Selection Rank (ATAR plus any applicable adjustment factors) required for selection, they may still be eligible for entry to some of our most popular degrees based on their grades in selected year 12 subjects. Students don't need to apply to be considered for subject-based entry, as this will automatically be done by SATAC on behalf of the University. Note: Students must have completed their SACE and achieved an ATAR to be considered. For more information. visit: adelaide.edu.au/study/ undergraduate/entry-pathways/recentsecondary-education

STAT (Special Tertiary Admissions Test)

If your child has not completed year 12 or any other higher education, they may wish to use the Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT) to gain entry to University. The STAT is a two-hour, multiple-choice test designed to assess a range of skills and knowledge needed to study at university.

The Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) coordinates the STAT. To sit the test, a student needs to be over 18 years old before 1 February in the year that they wish to commence study. If a student has been enrolled in the last two years, they must not have done more than two years (full-time) tertiary study in total. For more information, visit: <u>stat.acer.org/au</u>



Higher ed GPA (Grade Point Average)

If a student has completed at least six months (full-time) of a recognised higher education program at a recognised higher education institution, they can use their Grade Point Average (GPA) to gain entry to the University of Adelaide.

Internal transfer

Perhaps your child gained entry to a degree that was not their first preference or, after completing a few courses, they have changed their mind about what they'd like to study. Students can use their GPA (or any eligible previous qualifications) to apply for what is called an internal transfer. This is an option available to students who have already undertaken 6 months of full time study in one degree and, for a range of different reasons, would like to transfer into another degree at the same university. Please note that not all degrees are available via internal transfer. If unsure, you can always reach out to our friendly future student advisors for assistance.

VET Studies (Certificate IV or higher)

Has your child completed a TAFE or VET qualification at a certificate IV or higher? Their completed qualification can gain them entry to many of our degrees. For students that have studied at either TAFE SA or other Registered Training Organisations (RTOs), most Certificate IV Courses (including former Advanced Certificates or equivalent) meet the minimum entry requirements for a wide range of our undergraduate degrees. In some instances, a successfully completed Diploma or Advanced Diploma will be required to meet the minimum entry requirements.

University Preparatory Program (UPP)

The UPP is a free one year program for anyone who wants to get ready to enter university. It has been designed for those who have never been to university or have not studied for a long period of time. Steps to success

Applying to university is a big milestone worth celebrating! And it might also feel daunting, too.

Step 1

Explore your study options

Researching study options is an important first step for your child, and there are many different tools and resources available to help them. They could start by reading through our undergraduate program guides or heading online to explore our Degree Finder website.

Attending an Open Day is another great way for your child to get a feel for what university life is like, talk to lecturers and current students, and learn about the range of services available to support them during their university studies. They could also book a time to chat with one of our friendly advisors to ask any specific questions they may have.

Step 2

Check you meet the eligibility and entry requirements

All degrees have entry requirements—these are specific criteria your child will have to meet in order to be eligible for entry into a degree. Each degree will have different entry requirements, so it's important for them to find out what these are for their chosen degree and make sure they can meet them. Entry requirements can include things like:

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- prerequisites they will need to complete either during their high school (SACE/IB) studies, bridging courses or approved alternatives.
- assumed knowledge subjects that, while not essential for admission into a degree, will help prepare them for many of the topics they'll come across during their degree.
- non-standard entry requirements, such as: attending an interview, undertaking additional assessments (e.g. the UCAT ANZ), performing an audition, submitting a written statement or creative portfolio.

Step 3

Apply via SATAC

Applications open in early August for study starting in the following year. Your child can apply for their chosen degree/s through the SATAC website. Before they apply, it's a good idea for them to familiarise themselves with the application process. This includes things like key dates and deadlines for applications, as well as SATAC fees and charges and when to pay. For more information, visit the SATAC website.

Please note: for certain degrees that have non-standard entry requirements—such as medicine, dentistry, oral health, veterinary bioscience—key dates and deadlines for applications may differ. For the most up-to-date information, visit Degree Finder.

Step 4

Keep your preferences up to date

As part of their SATAC application, your child will be asked to list up to six preferences—these are the six degrees they are most interested in studying. SATAC makes offers by working down their preference list, so it's important for them to make sure their first preference is the degree they want to study most.

If you child changes their mind after they've submitted their application, don't worry. SATAC allows them to check and change their preferences as many times as they want before the cut-off date for their specific offer round. For a list of key dates, visit SATAC's website.

Helpful tip: While your child doesn't need to have all six preferences filled, they should include some 'back up' options on their application. If they need support in choosing the best back up options or pathways into their dream degree, our friendly future student advisors can help.

Step 5

Check your offer

SATAC run several smaller offer rounds, one main offer round, then continue to make offers in the lead up to the start of the study period your child applied for. SATAC makes offers for the highest preference your child is eligible for. This means the degree they most want to study should be their first preference. It's important your child check all email folders including their Spam folder—for their offer.

Helpful tip: Your child didn't receive an offer for their first preference? Don't stress—they'll still be considered for future rounds!

Accept your offer

Step 6

An offer email will be sent to the email address your child provided on their SATAC application. If they have received an offer they don't need to respond, as SATAC will accept the offer on their behalf. If your child would like to defer their offer until the following year, they will need to log in to their application through the SATAC website and change the response to the 'Defer' option. If the offer your child received was for a degree that is not their first preference, SATAC will accept the offer but note that they would still like to be considered for an offer to their higher preference(s).

After your child accepts their offer, we'll send them an email outlining important information to help them get started at University, including their new University ID number. At this stage, they can start to plan their timetable, enrol, attend orientation activities, and begin their university journey!

What to expect when your child starts university

Student life at the University of Adelaide is both exciting and challenging, and it may take some time for your child to make the transition and settle in properly.

They'll be expected to take responsibility for managing their own time, attending classes, studying, researching and completing assignments.

The transition to life as a university student

Unsurprisingly, life as a high school student is quite different to life as a university student. Your child is likely to have spent the last few years of their education in familiar surroundings, with their tasks assigned and explained by teachers they know well. They will have received regular feedback on their progress and capabilities and have a sense of belonging to a clearly defined, supportive and structured learning community. At University, students are treated as adults who are responsible for their own work and time management.

When starting at university, your child may be separated from their school friends and mixing with unfamiliar people in an unknown and less structured learning environment. To learn new boundaries and rules, they need to be alert and ask questions, academic expectations may seem more complex; and issues including plagiarism assume greater importance. They may also receive less direction from lecturers and tutors than at school and university staff will not chase them for incomplete or overdue coursework.

We have lots of programs and events to make the transition to university as smooth as possible. Orientation Week or O'Week—is a program of academic and social activities and information sessions aimed at helping your child get off to the best start. O'Week introduces your child to campus life: the University's services, resources, environment, and new ways of learning. It is also a great opportunity for your child to meet other students who are new to the environment too.

Study commitment

If your child is studying full-time, this means they will study four courses per semester. A full-time study commitment is made up of contact and non-contact time, and the specific time commitment required will vary between courses. Some students choose to study part-time, allowing them to balance study with other commitments. Contact time is the time your child spends in organised teaching sessions: mainly lectures and tutorials, although some courses will also include laboratory practicals, fields trips and clinical/ work placements. Some lectures are not compulsory; however, students are strongly urged to attend regularly as course content is covered thoroughly in lectures. To get the most from lectures, your child should take notes and do preparatory and follow-up reading.



There may be a large number of students at lectures, so smaller tutorials and practicals are held to help develop a more in-depth and hands on understanding of course content. During tutorials your child will actively participate in discussions, and often take turns leading the discussion and presenting papers to the group. Non-contact time is spent studying at home or in the library, completing assignments, preparing for tutorials and revising for tests and exams.

Money matters

Financial support that makes university education more affordable.

There is considerable help available with the financial costs of studying at university, which means your financial situation needn't be a barrier to your child's education.

Commonwealth supported places

Commonwealth supported places are available in all undergraduate degrees studied at the University of Adelaide. A Commonwealth supported place is subsidised by the Australian Government and students either pay their student contribution—that is, their contribution towards the full cost of their studies—up front or defer payment by requesting a HECS-HELP loan.

HECS-HELP is an Australian Government scheme to help students in a Commonwealth supported place to pay their student contribution. Australian citizens and holders of Permanent Humanitarian visas are eligible. In utilising a HECS-HELP loan, students require a TFN (Tax File Number). This loan is then managed through the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). For more information on HECS-HELP, visit studyassist.gov.au

Student support payments

Centrelink, on behalf of the Australian Government, provides financial assistance to full-time students (and, to a lesser degree, part-time students) with approved circumstances. Glossary

The following information should assist with understanding common terms used by universities.

Additional entry requirements

Acceptance into University degrees is based on academic merit, but some degrees require additional selection criteria. For example, Music degrees require applicants to undertake an audition. Medicine and Dental Surgery applicants are required to undertake the University Clinical Aptitude Test (UCAT) and, for applicants who perform well in the UCAT, an oral interview undertaken by the faculty. Oral Health applicants are required to undertake an oral interview undertaken by the faculty, and Veterinary Bioscience applicants are required to submit a questionnaire and, for eligible applicants who perform well, a Multi Mini Interview (MMI) undertaken by the faculty.



Adjustment factors

Adjustment factors are not simply added to your ATAR, they are calculated using an aggregate system. Your adjustment factors will be added automatically to your ATAR resulting in your Selection Rank, which is then used to gain entry into university.

Assumed knowledge

Knowledge that it is assumed a student will have before commencing a course but is not required to enter the course. SACE subjects are listed as 'assumed knowledge' for a number of undergraduate awards in programs and courses, the Program Guides and the SATAC Uni Guide.

Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR)

ATAR is used to determine the eligibility of students who have completed an Australian year 12 qualification for an admission offer and to rank them for meritbased selection. The International Baccalaureate (IB) diploma program is a two-year, pre-university course designed to enhance the transition of students between different education systems and to promote international understanding.

Deferment

An applicant who receives an offer of admission to a degree may apply to defer enrolment for one semester or one academic cycle. For example: if a student is offered a place in a degree, they may choose to delay starting their degree for another 6 months or up to a maximum of two years.



Prerequisites

To be eligible for some programs, particularly in the areas of science, engineering, maths and computer science, applicants are required to have passed specific subjects called 'program prerequisites'. For SACE applicants, program prerequisites are the nominated subject(s) completed at SACE stage 2 level, with a minimum grade of C- or better. Other applicants, i.e. higher education, TAFE and special entry, are required to have successfully completed either these subjects or their equivalent. Program prerequisites apply to all applicants to the programs.

Selection Rank

Selection Rank is the rank used to determine an applicant's competitiveness relative to other applicants, after all applicable adjustment factors have been added.

South Australian Tertiary Admissions Centre (SATAC)

SATAC processes applications for tertiary programs delivered by TAFE and the universities in South Australia and the Northern Territory.
