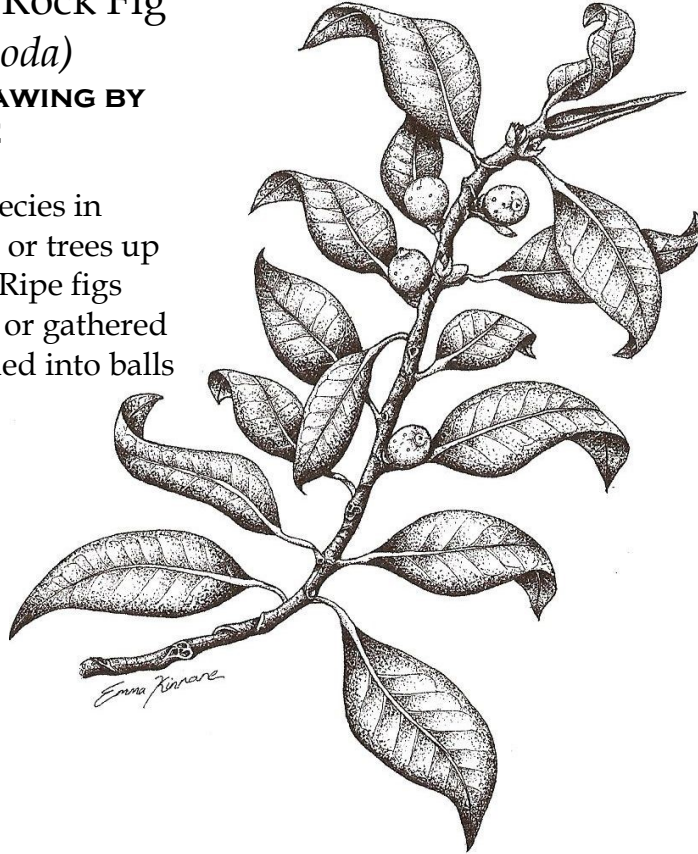


Small-leaved Rock Fig (*Ficus brachypoda*)

Only desert fig species in Australia. Shrubs or trees up to 11 yards high. Ripe figs may be eaten raw or gathered when dry and rolled into balls for storage.
