Manager's Musings

Retirement of Dr. Jennifer Gardner OAM

Dr. Jennifer Gardner is retiring at the end of February 2017 after more than 30 years' of service to the University of Adelaide as curator of the Waite Arboretum, and manager the Waite Conservation Reserve and the Urrbrae House Gardens. In her last curator's report in the latest Friends of the Waite Arboretum Newsletter, Jennifer has written a lovely reflection on her time in what she has called her "dream job." Jennifer's legacy goes beyond caring for and developing the Arboretum, Reserve and Gardens. I was delighted that Jennifer's years of hard work, commitment and dedication to promoting the environment and conservation were acknowledged with the award of an Order of Australia Medal in the recent Australia Day Honours' List.

On a personal note, I would like to publicly thank Jennifer for her kindness, generosity and always being an attentive sounding board when I have wanted to brainstorm an idea or share an experience at the end of a long work day. I know that I am not alone in saying that Jennifer will be missed. However, we all know that for Jennifer retirement will not involve just sitting back and putting her feet up. Her energy and passion will undoubtedly be put into other projects in the future. So we look forward to hearing about those in coming days.

With Jennifer's departure, Dr. Kate Delaporte will be the Acting Curator of the Waite Arboretum. Kate has been a researcher at the Waite for many years working on ornamental eucalypts and has a long association with the Arboretum through her work.

Historic Tapestry

In November Urrbrae House was given a beautiful historic tapestry by Susan Dutch, the daughter of Waite entomologist Professor H. G. Andrewartha and biologist Vevers Andrewartha (nee Steele). The Andrewartha Gate on Claremont Avenue that opens into our gardens is named in honour of Professor Andrewartha.



The large tapestry depicting Mary Queen of Scots was embroidered by Susan's great-grandmother, Mrs. Samuel Steele, and was awarded a Bronze medal at the International and Universal Exhibition at the Crystal Palace in London in 1884.

The Friends of Urrbrae House are supporting the conservation work by Mary Jose and reframing. The tapestry will go on display in Urrbrae House later this year.

A special wedding gift

Sometimes treasures are found in the most unexpected of places. An observant technical staff member on the Waite Campus spotted an interesting plaque on a cabinet in a Vinnies Op Shop late last year and contacted me to alert me to his find. Vale Dr. Max Tate
(19.9.1932 – 16.10.1916)

The Waite Community of past and present staff and students were greatly saddened by the death on 16th October of Dr Max Tate. Max recently achieved his 84th birthday having in the past year bravely undertaken an intensive program of immunotherapy and chemotherapy under trial for melanoma.

Max was born in Brisbane and developed a strong interest in chemistry through his BSc and Masters degree at the University of Sydney and focusing on the carbohydrate myo-inositol for his Doctorate at the University of New South Wales.

After two years of post-doctoral work in Canada from 1960, Max returned to Australia to face the challenge of getting a University position in competition with a surplus of organic chemists at that time.

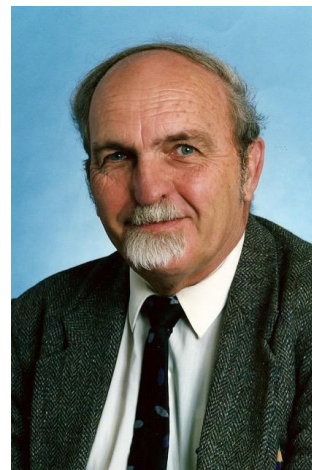
In 1964, Max got a position at the Waite in Virology in the Department of Agricultural Chemistry and Soil Science and was soon collaborating with several of his new colleagues on aspects of carbohydrate chemistry related to their research.

One of the most profitable collaborations was with Professor Allen Kerr on the biological control of crown gall in fruit trees. Allen and his students established that there was a chemical involved in the prevention of the pathogenicity of the soil bacterium *Agrobacterium*, which caused the crown gall, and named it Agrocin 84. Max and his students isolated and identified the unique structure of Agrocin 84 and Allen credited Max with being “by far the most important influence on his scientific career.” Subsequent work in Allen’s laboratory on the genetic background of the production of Agrociiin 84 led to the registration of NOGALL in 1987, the first live genetically engineered organism in the world eventually approved to be sold to the public. It is considered that this biological control of crown gall contributes \$100 million annually to the Australian economy, largely through the protection of almond and other fruit trees.

Based on the above study, and the importance the new methodologies of molecular biological utilized, Max and Allen lobbied for new staff appointments at the Waite with this expertise, resulting in several major new research initiatives on the Campus in the early 1990’s.

Another topic that Max applied his chemical knowledge too was that of the non-wetting sands that detracted from their use for agriculture in several areas of Australia. Professor James Prescott and CS Piper at the Waite first reported on the issue in 1932. In 1981, Dr Malcolm Oades encouraged Max to apply his chemical knowledge to the problem. A study by a postgraduate student from Indonesia, working in Max’s lab, led to the identification of the causal agent of non-wetting sands being a wax like material of plant origin. Working further with Malcolm they established that addition of clay could overcome the water repellency. As the work was completed it was learnt that Clem Obst, a farmer near Bordertown, had indeed solved the practical issue of the non-wetting sands by adding clay.

In the early 1990’s Max became aware of a practice in South Australia where seeds from a vetch crop were being marketed as the more lucrative lentil. Max knew that this vetch contained a neurotoxin and thus was unsuitable for human consumption. After attempting unsuccessfully to warn the farming community of this serious issue, it took a publication in an international science journal by Max and his student Dirk Enneking to get in a ban on the practice. Max retired in 1998 but as a Visiting Scientist at the Waite set up a successful breeding program to reduce the toxin level in the vetch. He continued with this, being in his lab seven days a week, until his battle with lymphoma interfered with this only a month or so ago.



As well as being a very supportive and encouraging supervisor of post graduate students, Max played a very valuable role as the post graduate coordinator in which he would regularly interview all postgraduate students in the Department and review their progress. When Roseworthy Agricultural College joined with the University of Adelaide I had the pleasure of sharing the first year teaching of chemistry there with Max.

Max was Head of the Department of Agricultural Biochemistry for the last three years of its existence from 1987 – 1990 and had a great working relationship with the Departmental Secretary Gladys Hogg. When the Waite Departments were reorganized in 1991 Max became a member of the Department of Plant Science.

Max was a very generous person and for the past 15 years has entertained about 40 of his colleagues to a lunch prior to Christmas in Urrbrae House. Those attending made a corresponding contribution to Urrbrae House, the renovation and restoration of which Max had a high regard for. In recognition of this Max was made the first Honorary Friend of Urrbrae House.

In her book, 'The Waite'* , Lynette Zeitz wrote 'With a career spanning over half a century, Max Tate represented the best of the Waite's collaborative research effort'.

Max is survived by his sons Marcus, Nicholas and Duncan and their partners. His wife Elizabeth died in 2009. Max concluded his eulogy for Elizabeth as follows:

"It is sometimes said that we all die twice. Once when our body physically fails us and the second time only, when the last person who knew you, or someone who read and approved of you or your exploits physically dies".

Based on the large attendance of past and present staff and students at the funeral of Max on 21st October, he will long be remembered.

'Enescu in Paris'

Our first concert on the 6th February 2017, 'Enescu in Paris' was well attended and a dazzling start to the year.

Both Elizabeth Layton (violin) and Michael Ierace (piano) have frequently performed at Urrbrae House. We were privileged again to enjoy their display of virtuosity, technical skills and sheer musicality.

The first part of the concert was the Sonata no 1 Op 12 in G major by Andre Gedalge (1856-1926). He was an influential French composer and teacher of the Romantic period. After a career in book selling and publishing he entered the Paris Conservatory at age 28. Although not well known for his performances as a musician, he became the favourite teacher of counterpart and fugue of his time.

This Sonata no 1 Op 12 in G major by was published in 1897 and was dedicated to his student George Enescu. He described George as one of the greatest geniuses of modern music.

The second part of the concert was the Violin Sonata no 2 in F minor by the Romanian born George Enescu born (1881-1955). George was regarded as the greatest musical phenomenon since Mozart. He was a child prodigy on violin and piano and entered the Vienna Conservatory at age 7 and graduated at 13. He continued his studies at the Paris Conservatory and became a violin virtuoso and teacher of violin. He also devoted himself to composing and although he wrote in virtually every genre, much of his work was influenced by Romanian folk music.

In the finale of the Sonata (Vif) we heard several motifs used to interlinked dances. This highly original work was much darker than the Sonata by Andre Gedalge.

Both Sonatas' were brilliantly performed by Elizabeth and Michael.
