

Manager's Musings

<u>Ballroom Transformation</u> The transformation of the Ballroom downstairs continues (Please see FOUH article to follow). In addition to the blinds provided by the Friends of Urrbrae House, Anne Rabone's family firm De Lights on Anzac Highway has kindly donated a new heritage-inspired lamp to provide additional lighting for musicians when performing in the Ballroom.

Women, Science and the Waite About 45 people attended a cultural conversation organised by University Collections on "Women, Science and the Waite" at the Charles Hawker Conference Centre on 30 October 2014. Cultural heritage historian Denise Schumann, Professor Eileen Scott from the School of Agriculture, Food and Wine, and myself spoke on the achievements of and challenges faced by female scientists at the Waite from the 1920s through to the present day.

<u>Concert Fundraiser for the "Flutes of Adelaide"</u> On 13 November 2014 a wonderful evening fundraising concert was held in the Urrbrae House Ballroom to support four outstanding young musicians from the Elder

Conservatorium to undertake an international study trip in 2015. Flautists Andrew Baird, Jennifer Bird, Kelsey Robinson and Alessandra Woods (who received the Governor's International Student Award for Excellence in the Arts last year) will be travelling to London and Paris this year for a series of intensive masterclasses. Associate Professor Elizabeth Koch OAM has been in touch with her network of highly esteemed international colleagues to organise the masterclasses for the young musicians. According to Associate Professor Koch the 2015 Flutes of Adelaide Study trip "will create opportunities for life changing experiences and provide exposure to knowledge in a unique professional environment unprecedented in Australia." Waite Historic Precinct Thank You Morning Tea On 18 November 2014 more than 50 volunteers who work in Urrbrae House, the gardens, Waite Arboretum and Waite Conservation Reserve attended our annual Waite Historic Precinct Volunteer Thank You Event. Long serving volunteers who have contributed 5, 10 and 15 years of service were formally recognised at the event. As the picture of Dr Peter Nicholls (15 year volunteer and retired University staff member) shows, the volunteers were also pleased to receive a copy of the Augustus Short history from the University's Chief Engagement Officer, Kate Robertson, along with their recognition certificates. A special highlight of the morning was a mini-recital given by Associate Professor Elizabeth Koch and flautist Jennifer Bird just for our volunteers.





Friends' Christmas Party 2014

Retirement of Professor Geoff Fincher

On the evening of December 1st, a cocktail celebration was held in Ayers House Ballroom to Honour Professor Geoff Fincher on his retirement from the University of Adelaide. The occasion was convened by Professor Bob Hill, Executive Dean, Faculty of Sciences with those paying tribute to Geoff including Professor Warren Bebbington (Vice Chancellor), Mr. Martin Hamilton Smith MHR for Waite and Professor Roger Leigh, Director Waite Research Institute.

Geoff was appointed as the Professorial Head of the Department of Plant Science in 1993 and had a key role with Peter Langridge in the award of the Centre in Plant Functional Genomics in 2002 to the Waite Campus. In 2011 he had the lead role in the award of the ARC Centre of Excellence in Plant Cell Walls being appointed as Director.

Geoff has published over 300 papers in International Journals with 58 having a high citation index. In October last year he was elected as Fellow of the Australian Academy of Technological Sciences and Engineering (ATSE) – one of the highest honours available in this area in Australia.

As a former Director of the Waite Agricultural Institute, from 2003-2007, Geoff had oversight over the development of more than \$100 million of state-of-the-art research facilities at the campus including the Australian Plant Phenomics Facility (the Plant Accelerator).

As Director he was also very supportive of activities of the Waite Historic Precinct.

Geoff will be continuing an association with his current research interests, both in Australia and overseas, as well as consultancy work related to this.

Role of the Bushmen's Corps in the Boer War (1899 -1902) and contribution of Peter Waite

The military history of Australia during the Boer War is complex, and includes a period in which the six formerly autonomous British Australian colonies federated to become the Commonwealth of Australia. At the outbreak of the Second Boer War, each of these separate colonies maintained their own, independent military forces.

Ten contingents departed from South Australia. The 1st and 2nd Contingents were financed by the SA Government, the 3rd (Bushmen's) was privately financed and the remaining Contingents were financed by Britain.

The Bushmen's Contingent of six officers and ninety-three men served from June 1900 to April 1901.

The South Australian Bushmen's Corps took pride of place amongst the South Australian contingents. It was funded by public subscription and the philanthropy of wealthy individuals. Its most prominent supporter was Adelaide businessman and parliamentarian Sir George Brookman who donated £1000. The contribution of Peter Waite can be seen from the report below.

BUSHMEN'S CORPS. Meeting of the Executive.

A meeting of the Executive Committee was held in the Mayor's Parlour, Town Hall, on Thursday, February 8. The Mayor, Mr A.W. Ware, occupied the chair.

The Secretary, Mr E.G. Blackmore, reported that since Tuesday £913 5s.10d. had been banked, and the total credit balance was now £5,167 15s. 9d. Owing to the small number of the volunteers over the age of 25 fit to be selected the committee proposed to examine applicants 23 years over, and who are able to produce first-class testimonials. The cooking and mess utensils and all requisites for the camp would have to be supplied. Mr Peter Waite had offered seven or eight horses from *Blanchewater and if not approved by the Selection Committee they were to be sold and the proceeds go to the fund.

Mr N.W. Stirling ◆ suggested that it would be advisable to remove the encampment away from the city, and stated that Mr Peter Waite had kindly placed his land at Urrbrae at the disposal of the contingent, or they may even go to Marino.

◆ Norman William Stirling was a son Edward Stirling and the youngest brother of Lancelot Stirling.

^{*}Blanchewater Station (later called Murnpeowie), a lease once held by Thomas Elder, Peter Waite and Nathaniel Phillipson, was a reputed source of horses for the Indian Army, Cobb and Co. and other commercial and domestic stables. Over four thousand Blanchewater brood mares and horses were advertised for sale in 1891.
