Manager's Musings

One of the great things about Urrbrae House is the sheer variety of activities undertaken in the house and gardens. So I thought I might just give you a snapshot of the events held at Urrbrae House over the course of one week.

Waite Historic Precinct Thank You Event – Thursday, 17 October:

About 35 volunteers from the Urrbrae House Historic Precinct, Waite Arboretum and Waite Conservation Reserve attended a special morning tea at Urrbrae House at which those who have given 5, 10 and 15 years of

service to the three areas were acknowledged. To show our appreciation of their efforts, volunteers were treated to a short, private recital by harpist and University of Adelaide graduate, Emma Horwood.

International Students from the English Language Centre (ELC) – Friday, 18 October:

Japanese and Korean Students studying at the English Language Centre were given a specialised tour of Urrbrae House to enhance their understanding of the history of South Australia and the University of Adelaide. The visit was organised in conjunction with Carmel Nicholas, Education Program Manager from ELC.

Vintage Picnic – Sunday, 20 October:

About 100 people explored Urrbrae House and its gardens at the Vintage Picnic organised by the Friends of Urrbrae House supported by Urrbrae House staff. Visitors were able to take free tours of the house, see a variety of historic cars and listen to acappella singing by the Adelaide Allsorts Harmony Chorus. In addition to the schools who attended this year, we have 24 schools on our waiting list to participate in 2014.

North Carolina State University visit with the Waite Research Institute – Wednesday, 23 October and Thursday, 24 October:

Urrbrae House staff facilitated a two-day visit and workshop in Urrbrae House for a high-level delegation from the North Carolina State University who were visiting the Waite Campus. The delegates were in Adelaide to develop future collaborative initiatives between staff and students of the University of Adelaide and the North Carolina State University.

Tours for Community Groups:

In addition to casual visitors coming into the museum rooms, booked tours during the week were provided by Urrbrae House staff to the Salisbury Garden Club, the Adelaide Women's Auxiliary of the Australasian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy, and the Aberfoyle Park Social Club.

We certainly never get bored at Urrbrae House and it is wonderful to be able to share this unique place with such a diversity of people.

We have been assisting our colleagues in the University Engagement Branch with the logistics and planning of the Vice-Chancellor's Waite Centennial Dinner which will be held at Urrbrae House and its gardens on 6 November. This dinner will celebrate the 100th anniversary of Peter Waite's decision to leave his estate, including Urrbrae House, to the University of Adelaide.

I am pleased to let you know that much needed restoration work on the northern balcony of Urrbrae House is going to be undertaken from 6 January -18 March 2014. There will be scaffolding across the front of the house and Urrbrae House will not be open to visitors during that period. However, there will be public access to the house during a Basketry SA exhibition which is being undertaken as part of the Adelaide Fringe activities in February. While we prefer not to have to close the house for such a period of time, we know that the Friends of Urrbrae House will understand why such work is so important for the future of the house.

Finally, I would like to thank everyone for their support to myself, Amanda and Ilonka during 2013 and wish all Friends a beautiful and joyous Christmas.

Rich Baroque Music

Adelaide's Ensemble Galante comprising Tim Nott [baroque flute], Brendan O'Donnell [recorders] and Glenys March [haprsichord] gave a marvellous concert of works by Bach, Spadi, Castello, Dornell and Quantz, all 17th century composers, in the Urrbrae House ballroom on 26 August.

Founded by Tim Nott in 2011 the Ensemble Galante is dedicated to performing music of the late baroque, galante and classical styles of the 18th century.

The highlight of the concert was the Trio Sonata in C Major

by Johann Joachim Quantz [1697-1793]. A German composer Quantz was regarded as the finest flautist of his day in Europe and rose to be a celebrated musician in the courts of Frederick Augustus II of Poland and Frederick the Great of Prussia. Not only did he compose over 300 flute concertos and 200 sonatas he was an innovative designer of flutes, features of which brought the instrument to its forefront in the musical repertoire.

Tim, Brendan and Glenys gave an exhilarating account of the music of the period: Pure magic.

The concert was arranged by Vivente Music on behalf of the Friends of Urrbrae House.

Twilight Concert

An almost full Ballroom at Urrbrae House hosted a wonderful concert given by the Vivente Quartet on the 23rd September. The quartet stepped in at the last moment and we were thankful that they did.

The audience were given a splendiferous 'Around the world tour' of many differing genres; perhaps visiting Austria whilst

listening to W.A. Mozart's Divertimento B-flat Major, K137 (adante, Allegro di molto and Allegro assai). Then we were swept away to Germany as we heard the beautiful and poignant Beethoven's Cavatina. This was contrasted sharply by Stephen Whittington's 'Windmill' – obviously coming to Australia as this skilled quartet emulated squeaky country windmills. The upbeat Percy Grainger's 'Molly on the shore' an ode to Irish folk music, had us smiling and nodding along. Gilles Apap's "Looking for a title' shone with gypsy Eastern European melodies and a superb 'knee slapping' beat. To finish with a wonderful rendition of Astor Piazzolla's 'Tango Ballet' the Vivente Quartet took us to sultry, sexy Argentina. It is no wonder that the audience applauded loudly at such an enchanting evening enjoying music from around the world, and heartfelt thanks from the Friends of Urrbrae House committee go to the quartet: Minas Berberyan, Erna Berberyan, Michael Robertson and Gemma Phillips for coming along at such short notice and performing with such verve and professionalism.

Latin Flair Concert

Urrbrae Agricultural High School – a vision realized

When Peter Waite wrote to the Premier of South Australia, Hon. A. H. Peake, and the Chancellor of the University of Adelaide, the Rt. Hon. Sir Samuel Way, in October 1913, informing them that subject to his own and his wife's life interests, he intended presenting the Urrbrae property of 134 acres to the University for scientific studies related to agriculture and a public park, he also advised his intention to provide 112 acres, adjoining Urrbrae, to the Government of South Australia for the purpose of establishing an agricultural high school.

In October 1915, When the Premier (Hon. C. Vaughan), accompanied by the Director of Education (Mr. M. M. Maughan) and the Director of Agriculture (Professor Perkins) met with Peter Waite to review the generous bequest Peter commented as follows: Continued...







'My particular concern in the matter was of course, the proposed agricultural high school, and I am quite convinced that no better site could be found for such an establishment, as after all it will be the city boys whom we will have to draw upon mainly for new settlement.'

(Register (p4) Tuesday 19 October 1915)

The Government subsequently purchased Woodside House, on the corner of Fullarton Road and Cross Road, to augment the bequest of Peter Waite.

WOODSIDE HOUSE

80-year-old Landmark Demolished

The demolition this week of Woodside House at the Government Orchard, Fullarton road, adjoining Urrbrae removes another old landmark. It was built more than 80 years ago.

The Government purchased the 20-acre block of land, on which the house stands 15 years, ago from Mr. Dridan to establish an agricultural high school, the late Mr. Peter Waite having given the adjoining 114 acres to the Government to be used by the Education Department for the same purpose.

Mr Waite said on many occasions that Australia needed men with a knowledge of farming and dairying, and of how to mend all farming machinery, shoe a horse, and drove cattle and sheep, in preference to educated professional men for whom there was no opening in business.

(The Mail (Adelaide) (p3) Saturday 10 January 1931)

In the current issue of the 'Education Gazette' appears the following, dealing with the Urrbrae Agricultural High School: — It is proposed to establish a boarding school to provide an education suitable for boys who desire to make farming their life's work. The curriculum will include English, history, mathematics, and geography, with special attention to science, and the development of scientific methods in agriculture. The course will be arranged with the two-fold object of affording general culture, and a knowledge of the theory and practice of the various branches of agriculture carried on in this State. It will extend over a period of four years, and will prepare lads to proceed either to Roseworthy Agricultural College or to the

University for the further study of agriculture, if they so desire.

(The Advertiser (p14) Thursday 29 August 1929)

Urrbrae Agricultural High School was the first agricultural high school in South Australia. Building work commenced in 1930 but the effects of the Depression meant that further work was suspended in 1931, as loan funds were unavailable to continue the building. The first headmaster, Mr A R Hilton, urged that the school open in these limited quarters, and it did so on 2 February 1932 with 60 students. Due to the limitation in building funds plans to operate as a boarding school were not proceeded with.

The Depression also meant that the supply of materials to schools was curtailed, so the Director of the Botanic Gardens, Mr Bailey, and the Director of the Waite Research Institute, Dr A.E.V. Richardson, both volunteered to provide equipment and materials to assist in practical training for students at Urrbrae. Although this training was limited at first, headmaster Hilton arranged visits to factories, farms and orchards around Adelaide and the school gradually began to make small profits from its produce. School records show that the average number of students from 1932 to 1948 was 82, but this had increased to over 300 by 1954 and over 500 in 1964.

Until 1966 the Waite Agricultural Research Institute rented most of the School's 134 acres to conduct field experiments.

In 1972, the first female students were enrolled and there are currently about equal number of boys and girls in just under 1000 students in five-year levels. Today the school is highly regarded not only for its comprehensive courses in Agriculture and Horticulture but excellent science and technical facilities.
