Manager's Musings

Floor restorations in Urrbrae House and Child's Bedroom project

I would like to thank everyone for their understanding about the need to limit access to the house in late November-early December to enable the restoration of floors in the Main Hall, Drawing Room and a downstairs Bedroom. Now that the downstairs bedroom floor has been beautifully restored (see attached photo) a specialist heritage carpenter, who is currently working on an Elder Hall project, from Kolen Carpentry & Joinery has been organised to reinstate the built-in wardrobes which were taken apart many years ago.

I was recently asked by a member of the Friends' Committee about members donating furniture and items that might be suitable for display in the bedroom once the room restoration work is completed. The room will be set up as a museum exhibition room reflecting a 12 year old girl's bedroom as the Waites' youngest daughter, Eva, was aged 12 in 1892. Furniture in the room could include a bed, small table, writing bureau and trunk. Items for display could include girls' clothing, toys, books and personal items such as hairbrushes. Please note that items should be made prior to 1892, be appropriate for a museum display and in the case of wooden items free from pests such as wood borers. Advisory Board of Agriculture meeting

We were recently able to help the Advisory Board of Agriculture (ABA) by enabling them (at short notice) to hold a two-day meeting at Urrbrae House on 4-5 February. The Board is the governing body of the Agricultural Bureau of South Australia and is comprised of representatives from the Bureau regions, government departments, the University of Adelaide and Women in Agriculture and Business. The Board provides advice and recommendations on agricultural matters to the South Australian State Government including direct advice to the Minister of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries.

History of the Adelaide Benevolent Society book launch

On 7 February the Adelaide Benevolent Society launched their new history written by Rob Linn, *The History of the Adelaide Benevolent and Strangers' Friend Society 1849-2012*, at Urrbrae House. The Adelaide Benevolent Society has been working since 1849 to improve the lives of South Australians in need. One of the Society's past benefactors was Miss Lily Waite who is briefly mentioned in the book. Lily Waite died in 1953 and bequeathed £3,000 to the charity. His Excellency the Governor, Kevin Scarce, and Mrs Scarce attended the launch and were given a tour of Urrbrae House.

"A Celtic Journey" by Emma Horwood - Fringe concerts at Urrbrae House

Amanda and I have been pleased to be able to facilitate "A Celtic Journey" by acclaimed harpist and soprano Emma Horwood and Adelaide Symphony Orchestra principal percussionist Steven Peterka being held in Urrbrae House during the Fringe Festival. Retirement of the President of the Friends of Urrbrae House

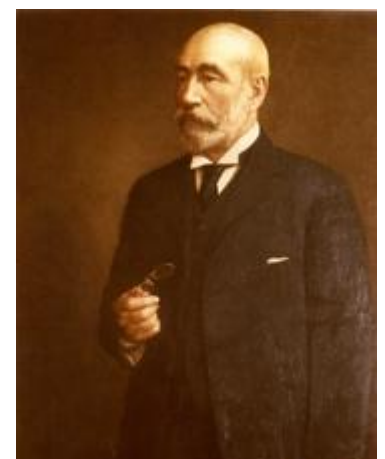

A Garden Party at "Urrbrae" 1910

As taken from the Adelaide Chronicle (p54) Saturday 17 September 1910

"The grounds surrounding "Urrbrae", Mrs. Peter Waite's picturesque home at Mitcham, were a beautiful blaze of all kinds of lovely flowers on Friday, September 9, when a large number of friends drove out to a garden party. The afternoon was not by any means a desirable one for an outdoor function, as steady rain fell during most of the day, so that nearly all the guests, with the exception of a few who strolled round the garden in between the showers to admire the masses of monster violets, pansies, and roses, remained in the house, the time passing very pleasantly with merry chatter and listening to the tuneful airs played by a string band.

Mrs. Waite received in the drawing-room which was charmingly decorated with bowls of exquisite double pink peach blossom and roses. Peach blossom also adorned the large square hall. Tea was served in the drawing-room, and although the air was damp, it was perfectly mild and calm, so that little groups of friends congregated around the small tables set out in the verandah and enjoyed their tea whilst admiring the lovely green parks below. Pink and red ranunculi formed a graceful decoration on the tables.

The hostess was attired in a handsome black silk gown, with lace effects on the bodice. Miss Lily Waite wore a smart navy blue Russian coat and skirt and a blue tricorne hat. A cream cloth coat and skirt was worn by Miss Eva Waite...."

As a regular volunteer at Urrbrae House I can just imagine the atmosphere and see the beautiful layout of the drawing room and verandah. I will think of the Waite's Garden Party at the next string ensemble event to be held in the drawing room. Perhaps you would like to attend a recreation of this garden party atmosphere at one of the FOUH events into the future? Minus the teeming rain, of course.

Looking after a quarter of a million sheep!

In the Primary School Program at Urrbrae House 'A morning in 1892' those playing the role of Peter Waite amaze the children with the fact that by 1874 (only fifteen years after he had arrived in South Australia) Peter was overseeing 260,000 sheep (1).

In 1870 there were 42m sheep in Australia, mainly in Victoria and New South Wales (2) and 6m in South Australia in 1876 (3). The contribution of the properties managed by Peter Waite was thus a significant one.

When Peter Waite arrived in Australia in 1859 he worked with his brother James for three years before purchasing the adjoining Paratoo Station with Thomas Elder (1). Paratoo had 5,000 sheep on it.

An early challenge was the Great Drought of 1864 -1866.

'The heat was extreme. There were choking dust storms and water sources failed. Hot winds and lack of feed killed off great numbers of stock and native animals' (4).

Peter arranged for over half his sheep to be agisted to the south east of the Colony so these could be brought back in good condition when the drought broke in 1866 (1).

Many of the pastoralists lost up to ninety per cent of their stock (5). The drought did however result in improved management of station holdings with Peter Waite leading the way through the introduction of fencing, reduced stocking rates, the sinking of wells, scooping out dams and the control of dingoes and rabbits. It was this astute and careful management that allowed the rapid build up of the sheep numbers on the properties he managed in the next eight years.

In an article in The Register (p14) on 15 October 1913 on Peter Waite, 54 years after he came to South Australia, his contribution to the pastoral industry was reviewed:

Mr. Waite was not slow to see the advantage of fenced paddocks, as against open country, and in 1863 commenced fencing. During 1870 and 1871 the enormous quantity of 265 tons of wire (imported from England) was erected. When Mr. Waite took charge of Beltana, Umberatana and Murnpeowie in 1869 they were practically unimproved, but between that date and 1890 no less a sum than £214,000 was spent in fencing and watering. Since then a further large amount has been expended in additional subdivision in sinking wells and in making dams and tanks, and a similar development has taken place on all properties in which Mr. Waite has been interested.

Some idea of the expenditure in money and labour under one head alone may be gathered from the fact that Mutooroo, Lilydale, Mulyungarie, Lake Charles, Murnpeowie, and Mount Lyndhurst are all vermin fenced, the total mileage being 1,001 miles. The result of this extensive system of improvement is shown by the fact that the number of sheep on Paratoo rose to 260,000 in the year 1874, while on the Beltana properties there were at a later date 383,000.

Last year when Tom Brinkworth bought the 33,000 hectare Uardry Station, in southern New South Wales, with a carrying capacity of 25,000 sheep it took the total number of sheep owned by the Brinkworth family to around 350,000 (6). Their properties stretch from Mount Gambier in South Australia to large holdings along the Darling River in western NSW.

This further emphasises the significance of the Peter Waite's effort in managing a similar number of sheep without the travel and communication supports of today.
